Our Vision is to provide quality education to the students from agrarian background.

Our Mission is to cater to the societal needs by shaping the students to be leaders in their chosen fields.

6.2 Does the Institution have a management Information System:

YES - The college has a well established management information system for academic and administrative functioning. All student information is computerized.

- 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:
 - 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

As an affiliated college we follow the curriculum prescribed by the University. Teachers also supplement the curriculum through add-on, certificate courses. Our Principal is the Chairman of the UG English Board of Studies and several staff members of our College are members of the University Boards of Studies. They contribute for the development of the Curriculum.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Meaningful learning is initiated through guided teaching, assignments, group discussion, seminars, debates, Power point presentations, quiz, lectures etc.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

College Level examinations are conducted periodically and the performance of the students is analysed and remedial measures are taken. Similarly after the announcement of the public examination results, remedial classes are conducted for students on need basis.

6.3.4 Research and Development

The college encourages the staff to undertake research activities and some of our staff have been acting as research guides. Several teachers have availed themselves of UGC Faculty Development Program for M.Phil. / Ph.D. and some have been working for their research degrees on a part time basis.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The college has two libraries to cater to the UG and PG student requirements. There are 64 class rooms, (8 with LCDs) and with adequate furniture. The science laboratories, the English Language Laboratory and the Computers' Laboratory are well equipped to handle the student needs as per the curriculum. We have two seminar halls and a big auditorium for guest lectures and meetings. The Gymnasium and sports facilities cater to the needs of the students. There are separate hostels for men and women students. The College has a student co-operative store, a canteen, and day scholars' dining rooms.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

There is optimum utilisation of human resources both from the teaching and non-teaching wings. Training is given to students by organising Guest Lectures by inviting experts from outside. Our staff members also serve on various administrative committees of the college for better coordination among the staff and administration.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Staff recruitment in Aided Courses is done as per the norms of the Government. In self-financed courses vacancies are advertised in news papers and staff members are recruited on merit basis after an interview.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The MBA, MCA departments have collaboration with industries and other departments also collaborate with universities and professors for research and organising seminars/workshops.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

Admission of students is undertaken as per merit and the rules of reservation issued by the Government. In P.G. Courses the admissions are made on the basis of the CET conducted by the Universities or the APSCHE.
