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## AKKINENI NAGESWARA RAO COLLEGE TIME - LINE

#### THE BEGINNING:

The Akkineni Nageswara Rao College, started as "The Gudivada College" in 1950 is the result of the munificence and zeal for higher education of the people of Gudivada Taluk and of the neighbouring taluks in Krishna District. Situated in a rich agricultural area midway between Vijayawada and Machilipatnam and connected by road, rail and canal with the leading towns and villages in the district, Gudivada has always been a centre of great cultural and political activity and its citizens have played a prominent role in the life of the nation generally and in particular of Andhra Desa. But the lack of a seat of higher learning was actually felt, and to meet this need a strong committee of local leaders was formed early in 1950 and an appeal for funds was made over the name of the following: Sri Parvataneni Venkataratnam (President), Sri Uppalapati Veerabhadra Rao (Treasurer), Sri Kaza Venkataramaiah (Secretary), Sri Vemulapalli Ramabrahmam (Joint Secretary) and Sarvasri Vadde Sobhanadri, Lingam Venkata Krishnaiah and Upadrasta Papanna Sastri as members.

#### **INAUGURATION OF THE COLLEGE:**

The College Organising Committee approached the authorities of the Andhra University in April, 1950 with the request that permission might be given to start the institution and has it affiliation to the university. The Inspection Committee appointed by the university visited Gudivada in May 1950 and reported in favour of granting the affiliation. The College was formally inaugurated under the name 'The Gudivada College' by Prof. V.S. Krishna, B.A. (Oxon), Ph.D. (Vienna), Vice-Chancellor of the University, on July 6, 1950 at a public meeting over which the Hon'ble Sri B. Gopala Reddy, Finance Minister, Government of Madras, presided. It was temporarily located in a fine building on the main road. The Secretary of the Organizing Committee, Sri Kaza Venkataramaiah became the Correspondent of the College.

#### **LOGO**

The motto of the College is TEJOBHAVATU (Let there be light) inscribed in the logo of the College. The goals and mission of the college also reflect this motto. Since the goal of education is to keep oneself informed and enlightened, the college has been striving to spread the light of knowledge in all directions.

## **Important Events:**

- **1951:** Biology, Physics and Chemistry group was opened and 94 students were admitted.
- **1952:** The College was raised to First Grade and B.A. and B.Com. Classes were opened.
- **1953:** B.Sc. class with Zoology (Main) and Chemistry and Botany (Subsidiaries) was opened. Civics and Indian Administration were offered as optional subjects in the Intermediate Programme, and in arts groups classes were opened in Sanskrit for Intermediate and in Hindi for B.A.

- **1957**: The Pre-University Programme was opened with eight combinations of optional subjects.
- **1958:** The Three-year Degree Programmes were started in the college, thus making our institution conforms to the national pattern of collegiate education.
- **1959:** Owing to a generous donation from Akkineni Nageswara Rao, noted Cine-Hero, the College was renamed as *Akkineni Nageswara Rao College* from April 1959.
- **1960:** The Tenth College Day was celebrated at the new site, on the present campus.
- **1969-70**: In accordance with a new pattern of education, the college started the new 2-year Intermediate Programme.
- **1971-72:** A new pattern of degree Programme (called New Scheme) with Main and Ancillaries was started with Telugu as the medium of instruction.
- **1974-75:** Starting of M.Com. Programme, thereby becoming the fourth affiliated colleges in Andhra University area to have the privilege of offering instruction at the postgraduate level.
- **1975-76:** The College celebrated its Silver Jubilee. Sri J. Vengala Rao, Chief Minister inaugurated the celebrations, which was attended by many other distinguished people.
- **1984:** Sri Yerneni Govindaiah Junior College building was completed on the eastern side of College.
- **1985:** The Foundation Stone for the Post-Graduate wing was laid.
- **1991-92:** Keeping the ever-growing importance of Computer Sciences and Electronics two new restructured B.Sc. Programmes, one with Electronics, Physics and Mathematics combination and another with Computer Science, Physics and Mathematics, were started.
- **1992-93:** The Post-Graduate Department was shifted to the new building.
- **1993-94:** Expansion of academic facilities are the order of the day and in keeping with this trend the college started the M.B.A. Programme.
- **1994-95:** The M.Sc. in Mathematics was started in the academic year. Foundation stone for the Post-Graduate Block II was laid by the then Chairman of UGC Prof. G. Rami Reddy.
- **1996:** Construction of the Men's Hostel completed.
- **1998-99:** The M.C.A., M.Sc. (Computer Science), B.C.A. and a new stream in B.Sc. Programme with Mathematics, Statistics and Computer Science were started.
- **1999-2000:** B.Ed. Programme was started during the academic year under the same Management in a sister institution, A.N.R.College of Education.

**2000-2001:** Post-Graduate Diploma in Management Information Systems and Computer Applications (P.G.D.M.I.S.C.A.) The first UGC Sponsored State Level Seminar on "Impact of Privatisation of Higher Education without Government Participation" on 10-11 November, 2001.

The College celebrated it Golden Jubilee Celebrations which were inaugurated by Hon'ble Chief Minister Sri N. Chandra Babu Naidu in which many other V.I.Ps. participated. The following donations were also received from several Alumni during this time. They are:

- Rs.10.00 lakhs Sri Ch.Ramoji Rao, Chairman, Eenadu Group, in honour of his parents Cherukuri Venkata Subbaiah and Venkata Subbamma.
- Rs.15.00 lakhs by Dr. Y. Lakshmi Prasad from his M.P. LADS fund.
- Rs.5.00 lakhs by Sri Maganti Rajendra Prasad.
- Rs.5.00 lakhs by Sri Punukollu Venkata Ratnam.
- Rs.1.00 lakh by Sri J. V. Satyanarayana.
- Rs.10.00 lakes by the other members of "A.N.R. College Old Students' Association" (ANRCOSA) towards the construction of Golden Jubilee Commemoration Building.
- **2002-03:** M.Sc. (Information Systems) was started during the academic year.

Golden Jubilee Memorial Building was inaugurated by Prof. L. Venugopala Reddy, Vice-Chancellor, Acharya Nagarjuna University on 17-8-2002.

M.Sc. Organic Chemistry was started.

The extension work of I floor of eastern and western wings of the main building was completed and it came into existence.

- **2003-04:** M.Sc. Physics, and B.Sc. with Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry in English medium were started. A Hostel for Women in the name of "Akkineni Annapurnamma Women's Hostel was constructed.
- **2005-06:** M.Sc. Microbiology, M.Sc. Botany were started.

A 400m Running Track (width 9.76 mtrs.) was laid during 2005-06 at a cost of Rs.3.00 lakhs which was sanctioned by UGC during X Plan.

The Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports granted Rs.3.00 lakhs and it was utilised by the College to equip the Gymnasium with Multi Gym.

NAAC Peer team visited our College and accredited the College with B++ grade.

- **2006-07:** Three National level seminars were organized with the assistance of UGC and NAAC
- **2007-08:** The annual intake of MCA course was enhanced from 60 to 120 from the academic year 2007-08
- **2008-09:** Two UGC funded National Level Seminars were organised.

The annual intake of MBA course is enhanced from 60 to 120 from the academic year 2008-09

A.N.R College secured FIRST prize by being adjudged as Best Performing Professional P.G. College in Examination results by Acharya Nagarjuna University.

A new Dining Centre was constructed in the Hostel.

M.Sc. Physics had to be closed due to lack of demand.

2009-10: M.Sc. Botany and M.Sc. Mathematics had to be closed due to lack of demand.

**2010-11:** The College affiliation shifted from Acharya Nagarjuna University to Krishna University as per the orders of the government.

Separate Dining Halls have been created for Men and Women Day Scholars.

**2011-12:** U.G. Seminar Hall was constructed in this period.

Hosted Krishna University Inter-collegiate Men Volleyball tournament on 18-11-2011

2012-13: One national level seminar was organized

B.Com. Computers was started.

M.Sc. Micro-Biology had to be closed due to lack of demand.

**2013-14:** On 22<sup>nd</sup> January 2014, Dr. Akkineni Nageswara Rao, Chairman of our College Committee passed away.

2014-15: A 10 KV Solar Power Plant was commenced.

An RO plant with 1000 lts. capacity was commissioned.

M.Sc. Mathematics course was revived.

ATM facility was made available in the premises of the College Andhra Bank Branch.

MCA had to be closed due to lack of demand.

**2015-16:** One workshop on Academic Reforms was organized.

M.Sc.Physics and M.Sc. Computer Science Courses were revived.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Akkineni Nageswara Rao College was started in 1950 as *The Gudivada College* with the mission of providing education to the youth from agrarian background and to cater to the societal needs by shaping them to be leaders in their chosen fields. The college is a pioneer in the rural setting and has been striving to provide quality education to the students. The vision of the college is to contribute to the advancement of knowledge through teaching, research, publications and dissemination and to train students to acquire good communication skills and leadership qualities so as to mould them to be global citizens. It has been offering relevant / need based courses from time to time and has been promoting interaction of the students with industry. It has been developing critical thinking among students and making them conscious of their duty to the society and fellow human beings by inculcating in them the values of equality, unity and justice.

Right from 1950 the college has been offering courses at the UG level in Humanities, Commerce and Sciences. It started the Post Graduate Department of Commerce in the year 1974, the fourth affiliated college to start M.Com. course in the Andhra University area and the course has been running ever since as an aided P.G. course. In the year 1991 the college started B.Sc. self-financed courses with Mathematics, Physics, Electronics and Mathematics, Physics, Computers. Statistics was also added as a combination in B.Sc. in the academic year 2009-10. In 1993 realizing the demand for a P.G. course in Management the college started M.B.A. and later M.C.A. and several M.Sc. courses. In conformity with the Universities to which it was affiliated the college offers English, Telugu, Hindi and Sanskrit in Part-I.

In addition, Environmental Studies, Science Technology and Development, Contemporary India: Economy, Polity and Society, Human Values and Professional Ethics, Communication and Soft Skills have been introduced along with core subjects. Since its first accreditation in 2006, the college has updated its infrastructure with ICT enabled learning. Four class rooms in the eastern wing have been made as eclassrooms. The teaching is student centered, and the students learn through assignments, seminars, group discussions, practical work, field trips and such other participative learning methods.

Our students participate in Collegiate, University, Regional, State, National level Seminars, Workshops, Debates, Quiz programmes, Paper / Poster presentation sessions, literary activities, and various exhibitions. The college offers certificate courses, add-on courses to develop the skills and the career opportunities of the students. In addition to the traditional courses like B.A., B.Com., B.Sc., applied courses in Sciences like Computers, Statistics have been introduced. The college is ready to introduce / revive any new course according to the popular demand.

To bring out the creativity of students, Akkineni Kalapeetam, the cultural wing of the college organizes competitions in debating, elocution, essay writing, quiz, music, dance and drama. Science exhibitions and surveys on contemporary issues are

conducted. The college provides opportunities to develop leadership qualities through the Men and Women Companies of NCC, NSS Unit, and the Red Ribbon Club.

Every year the college publishes the revised and updated Handbook of Information and Calendar which provides comprehensive information to the students on all aspects of academic nature. The College Magazine **Yuva Kalpana** brings out the literary talents of the students. Guest Lectures are arranged on a regular basis by inviting eminent persons from different fields.

Every year the College conducts the Sri. Uppalapati Veerabhadra Rao Endowment Lecture on "Ethics in Public Life" by inviting renowned persons. The endowment was instituted by our former President of the College Committee, Late Sri. Uppalapati Veerabhadra Rao. In addition, "Founders' Day", "Teachers' Day", and "National Education Day" are celebrated every year. Even while the students are taught the prescribed curriculum, they are exposed to different activities that help them imbibe leadership qualities required for the contemporary situation.

The IQAC was formed in 2005 during the preparation for the first assessment in 2005 and the College was accredited with B<sup>++</sup> Grade with institutional score of 82.7%. The IQAC of the College has developed several quality assurance mechanisms within the existing academic and administrative system. It envisages Total Quality Management, for quality sustenance and improvement in academic and administrative activities of the institution. It supports the organization of workshops, awareness programmes, extension lectures, curricula, teaching-learning evaluation, research oriented seminars, planning / implementation of advanced learning resources, ICT management and suggestions for empowerment of staff, leadership and governance patterns in strategic planning. It collects, maintains and analyses documents directly/through the College office. Policies/plans regarding quality assurance are communicated in the meetings of different sub-committees, teachers' council, non-teaching staff association, students, alumni, the university, state government and NAAC through different reports submitted. It analyses the feedback received from all stakeholders and informs all concerned about its outcome for correction and amelioration. Representatives of all stakeholders are present in the IQAC.

A brief summary of the academic and co-curricular activities, considered criterion-wise is presented below:

## **Criterion I: Curricular Aspects**

The College offers 6 UG programmes and 6 PG programmes, affiliated to the Krishna University. The curriculum is strengthened and supplemented by add-on and certificate courses. The College provides plenty of opportunities to the socially and financially weaker sections of society. It offers relevant courses to develop the skills and practical knowledge of the students. Many of our students achieved outstanding results in different examinations. For self-development, the faculty members are encouraged to attend orientation courses, refresher courses, workshops on curriculum development, meetings on examination reforms, quality initiative conferences etc.

Our Principal Dr S. Sankar is also a Member of the Academic Senate of the Krishna University and Chair Person of the UG Board of Studies in English. Several teachers of this college are also Chair Persons and Members of different Boards of Studies of the University and they are consulted on academic matters, curriculum design and development by the affiliating Krishna University. In fact the College also plays a key role in preparing the academic calendar of the University.

The staff members of the each department prepare a department wise semester / annual academic plan for their respective subjects showing the distribution of the syllabi. The annual/semester plans are prepared to enable the teachers taught to conduct lectures, revision and periodical examinations. Care is taken to allocate time for practicals, problem solving exercises, field visits, surveys, industrial visits, skill development in relevant subject-areas of study. The College facilitates innovative teaching-learning process through seminars and workshops based on the curriculum, audio-visual mode of teaching, study tour, use of ICT based teaching etc. The College has been introducing programmes based on societal demand by introducing subjects like Statistics at UG level and reviving the PG courses in Mathematics, Physics and Computer Sciences. JKC training for Competitive Examinations, Certificate Course in English help the students in preparing for employment.

## Criterion II: Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

To empower the student community through information and quality education the college uses its website to provide relevant information about admissions, staff, institutional facilities, rules and regulations, awards, incentives etc. The admission of students at the UG level is made on the basis of merit in the previous qualifying examination. The College offers opportunities in admission to SC, ST, OBC, women, differently-abled, economically weaker sections, minority communities as per norms and directives of the Government of Andhra Pradesh and the Krishna University. The college also provides remedial coaching classes for SC, ST, OBC, minority and economically backward students to enhance their academic performance. Merit-cum-Means scholarships and other concessions are available to the economically weaker sections. The details about the number of working days, dates of examinations etc. are provided in the Hand Book of Information and Calendar.

The College has well qualified and committed faculty. 17 teachers of our College were invited as Resource Persons / Guest Lecturers to various Institutes, Universities and Colleges for taking classes to UG and PG students and also research scholars. Our faculty members have been participating in workshops, seminars and conferences organized by national, international, professional bodies, as delegates, resource persons and chair persons.

The faculty members adopt innovative approaches to teaching-learning by using PPTs, LCD presentations, models, charts etc. Visits to industries, conducting socio-economic and health surveys are also encouraged by our teachers. Academic support, personal and financial support and guidance services are provided to students. The College libraries purchase books on a regular basis and subscribe to

various print and on-line journals, newspapers. Books for preparation for competitive examinations, syllabi and question papers relating to the University examinations are kept in the reference sections of the libraries for easy access to students. Internet facilities are provided to the students in the internet centre and to the staff in their respective departments. Almost all the departments have departmental libraries which supplement to the collections in the UG and PG libraries.

UGC sponsored remedial classes and coaching facilities are provided for students in general and especially for the SC, ST, OBC, minorities and economically backward sections of students. The Career Guidance and Placement Cell helps students to face the demands of competitive examinations. The teaching learning atmosphere prevailing in this institution is favourable for academic activities. The high percentage of results, 83% overall in all the programmes and 100% in most of the programmes reflect the commitment of our staff and achievements of our students. The volatility in market demand in several disciplines only made the college to redesign its strategies. Some courses had to be dropped and others were revived.

In the academic session 2014-15, the College bagged 155 distinctions and 331 First Classes. Four State level Pratibha Puraskars were awarded to our UG and PG students during 2013-14 and 2014-15. The College received award for being The Best Performing Professional PG College in Examination Results from the Acharya Nagarjuna University in 2008.

The College monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching-learning through IQAC which collects and analyses feedback from stakeholders and makes the necessary recommendations. Formative and Summative assessment is done by teachers. Examinations are held as per the College calendar and University schedule for continuous evaluation and preparation of the students to face the global challenges.

In addition to the academic training, the college provides avenues to students for career guidance and placement. The co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are taken up with zest. Parents are invited to meetings by teachers to inform them about the progress of their wards. Merit-cum-Means and endowment scholarships, amounting to Rs.1,00,000/- are distributed every year. The Merit-cum-Means scholarships have been instituted by the alumni and monitored by ANRCOSA. Cash prizes, gold medals, books and certificates are also given to students for their performance in academics, extra and co-curricular activities. Care is taken to instill the employability skills, social, environmental and ethical values among students. All these initiatives are closely monitored by the members of the Management, Principal and the faculty members.

#### Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

#### Research:

The institution encourages and extends all cooperation possible to promote research activities in the institution. Five faculty members from our college are research guides of different universities. Adequate support is given in the institution

for smooth progress and implementation of research schemes and projects and other research initiatives. Internet, LAN, print journals and e-journals are made available to all faculty members to facilitate research activities in the college. Teachers are motivated by the Management and IQAC to take up research oriented activities.

In the post-NAAC period our research guides produced 5 Ph.D. degrees and 39 M.Phil. degrees which is a commendable increase for any affiliated college and in conformity with the recommendations of the NAAC Peer Team. The College applied for Research Centre for the MBA Department and admitting scholars under the guidance of Prof. V. Narasimha Rao, Director, Self-Financed Courses. In addition, there are 4 other research guides viz., Dr. S. Sankar, Principal, Dr. K. Somasundara Rao, I/c. Dept. of Telugu, Dr. N. Krishna Mohan, I/c. Dept. of Physics, Sri P.J.S. Kumar, I/c. Dept. of Computer Science, admitting Ph.D. and M.Phil. scholars from other Universities.

9 Ph.D. and 11 M.Phil. degrees were awarded to our teaching staff and 2 M.Phil. degrees to our non-teaching staff members in the post accreditation period, while 6 teaching staff members and 1 non-teaching staff member are pursuing active research at present. 104 papers have been published by our faculty members in national/international journals, seminar / conference / workshop proceedings which is an increase of 63% in publications in the post-NAAC period.

The College was sanctioned funds for 1 Major Research Project and 2 Minor Research Projects from UGC during the X and XI Plan period amounting to Rs.5,07,000/-. There is a Research Centre of Krishna University for MBA and the scholars have been provided a separate room with the required facilities.

192 eminent academicians, administrators, writers, people in public service etc. visited our college as resource persons on various occasions and also to take part in the 5 national level seminars / workshops organized by different departments in the post NAAC accreditation period. 4 faculty members have acted as resource persons for national and international conferences and seminars.

Dr. S. Sankar is the Editor of General English Text book for First Degree Courses, under the newly introduced CBCS pattern, prescribed in all the Universities in the State of Andhra Pradesh. During the Post accreditation period, the faculty members have produced 104 publications in journals including peer reviewed journals of which 75 have been listed in International database. The highlights of the college include surveys conducted for the benefit of the community.

#### **Consultancy:**

Several of our teachers offered honour consultancy to academic institutions. Our Principal Dr. S. Sankar received Rs. 40,000 for consultancy and this amount was utilized for assisting students in paying fees etc., and giving money to guest faculty on teacher's day.

Dr. K. Somasundara Rao I/C of Dept. of Telugu also received Rs. 40,000 which was donated to service organizations.

Sri Y. Udaya Bhaskar, I/C of Dept. of Physical Education also received Rs. 57,200 which was spent for the benefits of students.

#### **Extension:**

The college has a good record of extension activities in organizing health camps, blood grouping, blood donation camps, environment and hygiene awareness, AIDS awareness, gender sensitization etc. A neighboring village, Bhushanagulla has been adopted by the NSS unit of the College for creating health care, sapling plantation, hygiene, and education awareness. Students visit the local old age homes, schools to extend help by giving clothing, books etc.

Our community orientation activities have been appreciated by the Acharya Nagarjuna University and our NSS unit was awarded a Certificate of Appreciation as the Best Blood Donating NSS unit in the University area. The NSS unit and the NCC wings organize communal harmony rallies, voter enrolment programmes.

Our NCC Officers of both wings received best ANO awards in the Battalion and were awarded Certificates of Merit by the District Collector, Krishna for the social service they have been rendering over the years.

The Women Development Centre (WDC) celebrates International Women's Day every year. WDC addresses issues regarding women staff and girl students, champions women empowerment, enlightens about employment opportunities, entrepreneurship initiatives, and creates health awareness. The extension activities promote the awareness of students and shape them as responsible citizens.

#### **Collaboration:**

The Collaborative activities of the college include research guidance, research projects funded by UGC, research publications, organizing seminars with the funding from UGC, NAAC and other agencies, career counselling initiatives in association with companies, guest lectures involving academicians from other institutions in India or abroad.

The English Department has a linkage with Community College, Philadelphia, USA. The Computer Science department has an alliance with "Entrepreneurship Development Cell" of IIT, New Delhi. The MBA department has MOUs with JOCIL Ltd., Guntur, the Ramco Cements Ltd., Jaggayyapet, the KCP Sugar and Industries Corporation Ltd., Vuyyuru and 3S Academy, Hyderabad.

#### **Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

The campus area is 23.43 acres with a built up area of 26,045 sq. mts. The physical facilities of the college have been expanded after the first accreditation by NAAC by building new classrooms, departmental rooms and internet centre in the first floor of the post graduate wing. There are 64 class rooms, 3 seminar halls, 2 libraries and 21 Science Laboratories, including Computer Science Laboratories and English Language Laboratory for practical classes. There are classrooms which can accommodate 60 to 90 students. The classrooms are well ventilated, with sufficient sunlight, ideal for teaching-learning activities. There are four e-classrooms. The

laboratories are upgraded from time to time with advanced laboratory equipment. A dining hall is constructed for the Hostels in 2011 and separate dining halls are available for men and women day scholars.

The College has a Guest Room with computer facilities. There is a dedicated Server with High Configuration for providing internet connection to the departments and the office. There is an auditorium with accommodation for 1500 students which is used for academic and cultural activities. There is an open air auditorium which can seat more than 2000 persons and used for general and public meetings. The UG Library has a built up area of 1333 sq.mts. and the PG Library has an area of 353.15 sq.mts. Both the libraries have reading rooms for students and teachers, print Journals, e-journals, internet connectivity, reprographic facilities, latest books on different subjects, syllabus copies for different programs, old / model question papers and prepared material for competitive examinations.

There are 63,500 books (including 9,859 gift books) in the UG Library at an approximate value of Rs.40.31 lakhs and 29,800 books (including 737 gift books) in the PG Library at an approximate value of Rs.69.62 lakhs. There are 51 journals in the UG Library and 78 journals in the PG Library. The PG Library has access to e-journals through DELNET and N-LIST and e-resources. Cataloguing of all books and journals has been done in the libraries and they use Oracle, D-CAP software. The books available in the library can be accessed through Local Area Network (LAN). There are 3 computers each in the UG and PG libraries. Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) is made available to the users. Both the libraries have photocopiers and printing facilities.

The College has a Gymnasium with 12 stations and modern equipment like Treadmill, Elliptical Bike, Electronic Vibrator, Stepper, Twister, Motorized Treadmill, Jogger Exerciser, Weight Lifting and Power Lifting sets. Our M.Com., student R. Syamala Devi who got training in this gym won the Gold Medal in Asian Power Lifting Championships in South Korea in the NAAC post accreditation period. Our former M.C.A. student M.S.N. Prasad is a Match Controller for Badminton Association of India (BAI) and worked in this capacity in Common Wealth Games, World Badminton Championships, Asian Badminton Confederation, 35<sup>th</sup> National Games etc.

There is a well organized Computer Laboratory in the PG wing with advanced configuration computers, 3 laptops, 2 note books and Local Area Network (LAN) with a High Configuration Server. The College has been benefitting from the LAN which enables fast flow of data across computers in various laboratories and departments. The staff and students use this facility to browse and download study materials, research papers etc. In all there are 234 computers in the college.

All the departments have been provided with computers and Internet connections. The computers or laptops are interfaced with LCDs to give Power Point presentations, guest lectures and for teaching. The college has a 10 KV solar power system which is environment friendly. In addition there are 3 generators of 10 KV, 82.5 KV and 180 KV are used during power cuts. AMC provision has been made for maintenance of computers, online UPS, Xerox machines, generators, College website.

The College has fire safety arrangements in place, which include fire extinguishers, fire buckets, terrace tanks, fire pumps, down comer and hose reel to douse the unexpected fire. The College also received No-Objection Certificate (NOC) from the Fire Department, which ensures that there are adequate fire safety arrangements put in place.

The RO plant provides safe drinking water in the college. Maintenance of toilets, bathrooms, service areas and security are done by employing necessary personnel or on contractual basis. There are two electricians for regular assistance in the college.

## **Criterion V: Student Support and Progression**

The college provides relevant information to the stakeholders through the college website, <a href="www.anrcollege.edu">www.anrcollege.edu</a>, and Students' Hand Book Information and Calendar. The College Magazine Yuva Kalpana publishes the reports of the events and the creative outputs of the students and faculty each year. In addition to the welfare schemes of the State and Central governments the college also provides financial assistance to students in the form of Merit-cum-Means scholarships. While 95% of students of the aided wing get social welfare scholarships the overall beneficiaries in the college both in aided and self-financed wings put together is 75%.

Rules of reservation are followed in admission. Railway and bus pass concessions are extended to the students. The Management members and the staff also provide assistance to deserving students by paying their tuition fees or examination fees etc. Free text books are provided in some departments and medical inspection and treatment facilities are provided to needy students. 18 students attending the communication skills classes have been identified for check-up by ophthalmologists and taken to Pinnamaneni Siddhartha College of Medical Sciences, China Avutapalli. Ten students were prescribed glasses and the total expenditure of Rs.10,000/-was borne by two lecturers of the English department.

Opportunities and facilities for career counselling, publication of articles in the College Magazine and other publications, preparation of posters, participation in sports, NCC and NSS and cultural activities facilitate students to develop themselves as well groomed students. In the post accreditation period, training programmes have been conducted for the benefit of our PG Students in association with "Campus Careers" and "Teaching Fish" institutes from Vijayawada.

The alumni association of the college, Akkineni Nageswara Rao College Old Students' Association (ANRCOSA) takes active part in all the events in the college and illustrious alumni are invited to inspire the present students and encourage them to prepare for competitive examinations and academic positions.

In special cases personal, career and psychological counselling is offered by the Faculty, Principal and Management Members. The College adopted the UGC Regulations on curbing the menace of ragging in higher educational institutions and has constituted an Anti-Ragging Committee governed by the senior staff members of the College. The rules and the punishment for ragging are displayed at the entrance of the college. No instances of ragging have been reported during the last four years. The alumni hold annual meets on the campus involving the Principal, staff and Management. The College is proud to have distinguished alumni from several walks of life. Many of them contribute to the progress of the College with advice and aid.

Many of our students have been securing first class marks in the University examinations. Our results are better compared to the results of neighbouring colleges and the average pass percentage in all courses is better than the University average. Progression to higher education in the last four years is above 42% from UG and 9% from PG to Research. 5% of our students are selected in campus placement, 40% of our students secure employment and 1% of students are self-employed. Academic counselling is provided to students at risk of failure and drop-out. Fee concessions are provided to economically backward students.

Academic/personal/social counselling, concept clarification, discussions, mock tests and examinations, problem solving exercises, providing simple but standard course material, remedial coaching, revision of portion covered, training in communication skills, tutorial classes are undertaken by our staff for the benefit of the students. Our College organized 9 University Level Tournaments / Sports Meets and Training Camps in the post-accreditation period. There are student representatives in important academic and administrative bodies for development, quality sustenance and enhancement. The Akkineni Kalapeetam has made significant contribution to the cultural heritage of the College.

## Criterion VI: Governance, Leadership and Management

The College Governing Body is the highest decision making authority and the Principal is its member. Along with the President, Secretary and Correspondent, Treasurer of the College Committee the Principal plays an active role in the governance and management of the institution. There is transparency in the functioning of the College and continuity in carrying out the mission of the college, viz., providing education to the youth from agrarian background and to cater to the societal needs by shaping the students to be leaders in their chosen fields.

The College has been able to get funds from the Government UGC, CCE, RUSA, the Social Welfare departments, NCC and NSS wings, philanthropists, retired staff and alumni. In the post accreditation period two alumni of the college donated Rs. 1,00,000/- each. The funds so received have been spent on creating infrastructure, organizing seminars and workshops, granting scholarships etc. to students, organising extension activities, instituting Merit-cum-Means scholarships.

The College has an efficient internal management system under the leadership of the Principal for designing and implementing its policies and plans effectively. The work of the college is carried out through various committees consisting of teaching / non-teaching staff members and students. Some of these committees include the members of the Governing Body also. Need based suggestions are taken from the stakeholders, students, alumni, parents, local community, government, non-governmental organisations in institutional plans. A Grievance Redressal Cell

functions in the college. Further, individuals seeking information under the Right to Information Act can approach the college by following the procedure for appeal in the RTI Booklet placed on the college website.

There is teamwork in the college for implementing all plans and policies. While there is decentralization in the administrative process, there is co-operation in working and sharing of knowledge. The development activities are supervised by the Management which takes timely initiatives for extension of buildings, providing additional facilities, introduction of new courses, appointment of new faculty etc.

The administrative hierarchy is followed to ensure harmonious execution of work. The IQAC of the College collects feedback on the performance of the teachers and the overall institutional performance from the students, which is submitted to the Principal for necessary actions and for further improvement of the facilities offered by the institution.

The salary of the aided staff is paid by the Commissionerate of Collegiate Education and the salaries of the guest faculty and the staff in self-financed courses is paid by the Management. The permanent aided staff members are under the Pension Scheme and Group Insurance Scheme while those in self-financed are in EPF and General Insurance Scheme. The College applies for funds under various UGC schemes for the buildings, development projects, academic undertakings of the institution. In the aided wing, the income and expenditure are monitored by the auditors from the State government. In self-financed courses an Auditor is appointed by the College Management for inspection and transparency is maintained in financial matters of the college.

#### **Criterion VII: Innovations and Best Practices**

The College undertakes various activities relating to the environmental protection. The institution takes all possible steps to make the campus eco-friendly. The use of plastic bags etc. is avoided on the campus. The college also uses 10 KV Solar Power which is Renewable Energy. The College with its greenery has been contributing to lowering the levels of carbon dioxide in this region. The campus is made a smoke free zone. The college has a botanical garden and a garden for medicinal plants, which are maintained carefully by the college authorities. Metal, glass waste, e-waste is disposed for recycling.

The College organized Farmers' Meets, Seminars, invited talks on environmental issues to create awareness. Swachch Bharat Abhiyan is undertaken in the college. Faculty Development Programme is organized for the benefit of newly recruited staff.

Feedback is collected from the students and analysed for necessary action. Teacher-ward system is followed. Students are taken to exhibitions, workshops, seminars, sport-meets, health check-ups etc. to promote a kindred spirit among the students.

The College uses ICT extensively in academic and administrative fields. Meritorious students are provided additional reading material and books to strengthen

their knowledge. Remedial Classes are conducted for academically weaker students and students from socially weaker sections. Several departments provide reading material. An Endowment Lecture is organised on "Ethics in Public Life" every year by inviting reputed persons. It creates an awareness and understanding of the intricacies involved in public life and how the students should cope with them.

The College has linkages with industries and academic institutions. Field work, surveys, health awareness programmes, blood grouping and donation camps are organized. "Earn while you learn' scheme has been in existence in the college libraries. Research is encouraged and several staff members of the college are acting as research guides.

Free coaching classes are organized to the students of our college and also to the students from nearby colleges for University Common Entrance Tests and ICET. A large number of Merit-cum-Means scholarships are provided mainly for students who are not getting scholarships from the Government. Gender sensitization programmes are organised by the Women Development Centre.

The College has been contributing money to the deserving poor students to enable them to continue their studies. Health check-up camps are conducted for men and women students. Some students in need of medical support have been provided money to meet their health needs. Similarly students have been provided books or money for purchasing books to assist them in their studies.



#### 1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

#### Vision:

The vision of the college is to contribute to the advancement of knowledge through teaching, research, publications and dissemination of information. To this end the College strives:

- To train students to acquire good communication skills and leadership qualities and to mould them to be global citizens.
- > To offer relevant / need based courses from time to time.
- > To promote interaction with industry.
- > To develop critical thinking among students.
- To make students conscious of their duty to the society and fellow human beings.
- To inculcate values of equality, unity and justice.

#### **Mission:**

Akkineni Nageswara Rao College was started, as The Gudivada College in 1950, with the mission of providing education to the youth from agrarian background and to cater to the societal needs by shaping them to be leaders in their chosen fields. The college is a pioneer in the rural setting and has been striving to provide quality education to the students.

#### **Objectives:**

- > To prepare the youth for the changing times.
- > The college has been starting need based courses from time to time.
- ➤ Right from 1950 the college has been offering courses at the UG level in Humanities, Commerce and Sciences.
- ➤ It started the Post Graduate Department of Commerce in the year 1974, the fourth affiliated college to start M.Com. course in the Andhra University area, and the course has been running ever since as an aided P.G. course.
- ➤ In the year 1991 the college started B.Sc., self-financed courses with Mathematics, Physics and Electronics. Mathematics, Physics, Computers and Statistics was also added as a combination in B.Sc. in 2009.
- ➤ In 1993 realizing the demand for a P.G. course in Management the college started M.B.A. and later M.C.A. and several M.Sc. courses.
- ➤ In conformity with the Universities to which it was affiliated the college offers English, Telugu, Hindi and Sanskrit in Part-I.

- ➤ In addition, Environmental Studies, Science Technology and Development, Contemporary India: Economy, Polity and Society, Human Values and Professional Ethics, Communication and Soft Skills, Science and Civilization are offered along with core subjects.
- ➤ Since its first accreditation in 2006, the college has updated its infrastructure with ICT enabled learning. Four class rooms in the PG wing have been made as e-Classrooms. The teaching is student centered, and the students learn through assignments, seminars, group discussions, practical work, field trips and such other participative learning methods.
- ➤ Our students participate in Collegiate, University, Regional, State, National level Seminars, Workshops, Debates, Quiz programmes, Paper / Poster Presentation sessions, literary activities, and various exhibitions.
- ➤ The college offers Certificate courses, Add-on courses to develop the skills and the career opportunities of the students.
- ➤ In addition to the traditional courses like B.A., B.Com., B.Sc., applied courses in sciences like Computers, Statistics have been introduced. The college is ready to introduce / revive any new course according to the popular demand.
- ➤ To bring out the creativity of students, Akkineni Kalapeetam, the cultural wing of the college organizes competitions in debating, elocution, essay writing, quiz, music, dance and drama. Science exhibitions and surveys on contemporary issues are conducted. The college provides opportunities to develop leadership qualities through the two wings of NCC (for men and women), NSS, and the Red Ribbon Club of the college.
- ➤ Every year the college publishes the Academic Calendar which provides comprehensive information to the students on all aspects of academic nature.
- > The College Magazine Yuva Kalpana brings out the literary talents of the students.
- ➤ Guest Lectures are arranged on a regular basis by inviting eminent persons from different fields.
- ➤ The college conducts the UVR Endowment Lecture every year on "Ethics in Public Life" by inviting renowned persons. The endowment was instituted by our former President of the College Committee, late Sri Uppalapati Veerabhadra Rao.
- ➤ In addition, "Founders' Day", "Teachers' Day", and "National Education Day" are celebrated every ear.
- ➤ Even while the students are taught the prescribed curriculum, they are exposed to different activities that help them imbibe leadership qualities required for the contemporary situation.

## 1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

- ➤ The college follows the annual system for the second and third year UG students. The Semester System is followed for first year UG courses (from the academic year 2015-16), and also for all the PG courses.
- > The curriculum followed is prescribed by the university.
- ➤ Every year, for the annual pattern courses, an academic planner is prepared for the college in general and for the respective departments in particular.
- ➤ The faculty members maintain and take measures to complete the syllabi within stipulated time. If, for any reason they fail to complete the syllabi within the stipulated time they engage extra classes for covering their portion.

## 1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

The Academic Calendar of the College gives the teachers the duration of the session, the dates of different examinations and the different types of activities that are scheduled during the year. In addition the circulars relating to the changes or modifications in the curriculum received from the Government and the University are communicated to the staff for implementation. Copies of these are also made available to the staff. The faculty members are deputed to attend training programmes, seminars, workshops etc. for updating their knowledge and skills. This training helps the teachers for effectively imparting the curriculum and also improves their own teaching practices.

Generally workshops are organized by the University or the Government agencies when new patterns of syllabi are introduced. Teachers take part in such training programmes and in turn some of our teachers, thus trained, also act as resource persons for giving training to others. The institution always encourages the faculty members to participate in such academic endeavors. From lectures, discussions, quiz, using ICT etc., the teachers adopt different approaches for translating the curriculum and also going beyond.

Taking the needs of each department into consideration, the faculty members are given an advance for purchase of text books, reference books, journals relating to their subject. Each department is provided a computer with Internet facility; reprographic facility and scanning are also made available to them.

# 1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

In departments where there are multiple faculty members the work is distributed as per the academic calendar and the general time table is provided by the Principal. In turn each individual teacher prepares detailed lesson plans for the subject to be handled. This enables the teachers to prepare themselves for the lectures till the pre-public examinations and revision of the syllabus there after. The progress of teaching is monitored on a weekly basis by the concerned in-charge of department and on a monthly basis by the Principal. Necessary suggestions are made for teaching the curriculum in an effective manner.

The syllabus prescribed by the University has provision for ICT related/oriented courses in Arts, Commerce and Science groups. Teachers are sensitized on the use of computers and in turn they create the needed awareness to the students. Four class rooms are furnished with video/audio facilities. The availability of computers and internet access in the departments help the faculty members to keep themselves upto date in their respective subjects.

In addition, problem solving exercises in the class and at home, field trips, case studies, surveys, industrial study tours, project works etc. ensure skill development in relevant subject-areas of study.

Students are given a clear idea that whatever they learn in the classroom has an external application i.e. in the society and care is taken to enable students transact the curriculum in real life situations.

## 1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the University in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

The institution is regularly in touch with the University to which it is affiliated. Regular meetings, both formal and informal, are conducted at the department level by the in-charges of the department and by the Principal at college level, throughout the year to keep the teaching activity upto date with the current trends. Academicians, Professors from the University faculty members from other constituent Colleges are invited for guest lectures, discussions, workshops etc. for interaction with the faculty members and the students. Our faculty members share their knowledge and experiences with members of different Boards of Studies in the meetings called for by the University. On a regular basis our faculty members participate in workshops, seminars and conferences at University, State, National and International level. These experiences help in imparting the curriculum in much more effective manner. The College also collaborates with NGOs, other academic Institutions, the affiliating University and other Universities in organizing seminars and workshops that address the improvements of the teaching learning process. The Career Guidance and Counselling Cell organises programmes related to various disciplines with different agencies.

Members of the Industry are invited to interact with our staff and students to give advice on the needs of the Industry. Some of these visitors are among the stakeholders of the college and they evince a keen interest on the progress of the institution. During the last academic year our MBA students visited the following Industries:

- 1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University? (Number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.)

The College is non-autonomous institution and it cannot design the curriculum. The curriculum prescribed by the University is based on the common core frame work of the Andhra Pradesh State Council of Higher Education (APSCHE). But several of our teachers are members of the UG / PG Boards of Studies of different subjects and their recommendations and suggestions carry weight in the decisions taken by the Academic Council of the University. The following faculty members of our college have been appointed as the members of Krishna University committees. They are:

- **Dr S. Sankar**, Principal, is the Chairman, UG Board of Studies in English and also Member of the Academic Senate of the Krishna University.
- **Dr G. Satyanarayana Sastry,** In-charge of the Department of Chemistry, is the Chairman, Board of Studies for UG courses in Chemistry.
- **Sri G. Ramprasad Babu,** former In-charge of the Department of Botany, is a Member, Board of Studies for UG courses in Botany.
- **Dr. V. Narasimha Rao,** Director, Self-Financed Courses, In-charge of the Post Graduate Department of Business Administration is a Member, PG Board of Studies in Management.
- **Sri P.J.S. Kumar,** In-charge of the Department of Computer Science is a Member, UG Board of Studies in Computer Science.

They have been actively participating in framing, modifying and the implementation of the University syllabi of the respective courses and preparation of model question papers. Our staff members are also called upon to prepare schemes of valuation for the guidance of the examiners in the University valuation work. Some of our staff members have also been called upon to act as resource persons in seminars and workshops organized by the University from time to time. Feedback is also collected from the examiners attending University spot valuation work and forwarded to the University for appropriate action.

1.1.7 Does the institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating university) by it? If 'yes', give details on the process ('Needs Assessment', design, development and planning) and the courses for which the curriculum has been developed.

In order to equip the students with additional degrees / diplomas / certificates the College has been organizing Career Oriented Programmes (JKC Training), Certificate Courses and Add-on courses.

## 1.1.8 How does institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

The objective of a curriculum is to make student reach an established standard or reach an anticipated demand. So the College has introduced new courses and combinations in its 65 year existence and the endeavour of the college is to provide courses relevant to the times. Some of our students have excelled themselves and achieved ranks in the University examinations. Some of our faculty members are the Chair Persons / Members of the Boards of Studies of the University or the neighbouring autonomous colleges. They have been contributing towards the designing of new syllabi or restructuring of the syllabi. Value-based education is imparted to the students to inculcate moral values among them through classroom-teaching and interaction with them. The college has been organising an Endowment Lecture regularly on Ethics in Public Life by inviting a prominent person.

Feed-back in analyzing the implementation of the stated curriculum is taken from academicians, peers, students and other stakeholders. Based on this feedback, suggestions are made to the teaching faculty. The college prepares a result-graph for the College as a whole and also those for the individual departments to advise the faculty to make suitable remedial measures. Remedial classes are conducted to help the academically weaker students in different subjects. When prominent people visit the college their views and suggestions are recorded and appropriate action is taken to implement them.

The efforts of the college have been aimed at developing the overall personality of the students. So extra-curricular activities such as sports, cultural programmes, NCC and NSS activities are encouraged to this end. Health and Environment awareness projects are also given importance. These extension activities supplement the teaching and learning process. Thus the College fulfils its motto "Enter to Learn - Leave to Serve" by making the students community oriented and trained to discharge societal needs.

Red Ribbon Club (RRC) is a movement initiated by the Government of India in educational institutions through which students will develop an awareness on AIDS. Through Red Ribbon Club youth are encouraged to learn about safe and healthy lifestyles. The RRC promotes access to information on safe sexual behaviours and voluntary blood donation so as to enable them to become change agents in HIV and AIDS programme. Its activities are organized by the NCC and NSS wings of the college. With the help of the students, they create awareness in the surrounding neighborhoods on HIV and AIDS. All these initiatives help the students to perform real-world situation.

#### 1.2 Academic Flexibility

## 1.2.1 Specifying the goals and objectives give details of the certificate/diploma/ skill development courses etc., offered by the institution.

## Goals and objectives:

After the 1980s the students have been facing stronger competition on the local, national and global levels. So in the early 1990s the college has started courses in

computer science and adding need based courses from time to time. The efforts of the college have been to produce students prepare to face the needs of the time. Since there is no possibility of starting new combinations in the aided sections, the College started offering a new range of course-options in the self-financed undergraduate and post-graduate programmes. These courses are in consonance with the growing needs at state, national and global level.

#### **Certificate Courses offered:**

Value addition is the need of the hour and in tune with the demand for professional and skill development, the college has been offering Certificate programmes in English.

At present there is no possibility of pursuing a twinning dual degree in our college. But, the students can also pursue the programmes offered through the distance education centres of Dr.B.R.Ambedkar Open University and Acharya Nagarjuna University.

Range of Core / Elective options offered by the University and those opted by the college.

The University prescribes the study of General English and Second Language as compulsory for the first and second years of graduate course.

- 1. B. A. Economics, History, Politics
- 2. B.Com. (General) and B.Com (Computers) Accountancy, Auditing, Costing, Marketing, Taxation and Finance, Computers
- 3. B.Sc. Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Computers, Statistics

#### > Choice Based Credit System and range of subject options

The affiliating Krishna University, introduced Choice Based Credit System for B.A., B.Com., B.Sc., and M.B.A from the academic year 2015-16 starting with changes in the First Year Degree Course.

#### Courses offered in modular form

In the UG programmes, courses are provided unit wise and the question paper is also based on this pattern which is framed by the respective UG Boards of Studies of the University. The modules thus arranged are covered by the faculty members and the monthly examinations are based on the modules covered.

The same procedure is followed in the Semester pattern for the PG courses and the students have to prepare for the prescribed number of modules for the Internal Assessments / Examinations and for the Semester end University Examinations.

## Credit transfer and accumulation facility

At present there is no possibility for Credit transfer and accumulation.

## ➤ Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programmes and courses

Lateral entry is not in existence for the students in UG and PG programmes. However there is a wide range of choice for vertical mobility for students pursuing UG programmes. Similarly the students who complete their PG courses are eligible to pursue research leading to the award of M.Phil. and Ph.D. degrees of different Universities.

The concept of instant examinations and advanced supplementary examinations in UG courses helps the students in their vertical mobility to higher courses, without losing one academic year.

#### > Enrichment courses

The curriculum for UG courses is designed /framed by the APSCHE and Boards of Studies of the University. While there is not much scope for the individual colleges for course enrichment, efforts are made to supplement to the prescribed topics by providing additional resources that go beyond the topics / modules designed by the University. To enrich the prescribed course the College encourages the faculty members to apply innovative teaching-learning methods through extension lectures, seminars, workshops based on the curriculum. Audio-visual aids are also used with regular teaching. Study tours, field-work, project-work, surveys etc. are also employed. ICT based learning resources also help in enriching the teaching learning process and to this end the libraries and the internet centres are modernized for the benefit of the students.

# 1.2.4 Does the institution offer self-financed programmes? If 'yes', list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.

The College offers 3 self-financed courses in UG and 5 in PG at present. They are:

These UG self-financed courses differ from the aided courses by offering Computers, Statistics as additional subjects and there is a good demand from students for joining in these courses. All the PG self-financed courses have been started in our college owing to the societal demands and give a chance to students facilitating admissions in these courses. The qualification for recruiting faculty members is as per the norms of the affiliating University, UGC or AICTE. The staff members are paid the Fifth Pay Commission pay scales of the State Government. Sometimes there is greater demand for the self-financed courses offered in affiliated colleges like ours. Admissions to the UG courses are made on the basis of merit and following the reservation norms of the government. The admissions to PG courses are made on the basis of Common Entrance Tests duly following the University rules. The fee structure prescribed by the affiliating university is collected by the College.

# 1.2.5. Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.

YES.

- For all the UG courses there is a paper on "Human Values and Professional Ethics" which promotes values of life and ethical behaviour which would come in handy for a new job seeker. The students in general and the society at large benefit from the training thus imparted.
- ➤ In the first two years of under graduate study students are taught listening and speaking skills with emphasis on LSRW (Listening, Speaking, Reading and Writing) skills.
- ➤ Practical orientation in science subjects provides hands-on experience and the required training for applying the theory learnt in the class room.
- In commerce course training is given in areas like banking, accounting, management

and finance; all these are relevant to the local needs of employment agencies like Banks, Industry etc. The commerce graduates can pursue career advancement like in Banking or can go for C.A., I.C.W.A., etc.

- ➤ The Certificate Courses provide the relevant skills for employment locally or nationally.
- ➤ The JKC of the college trains students in:
  - Communication Skills
  - Analytical Skills
  - Computer Skills.
  - General Awareness
- ➤ The programmes offered through Distance Education assist students who can't attend regular college and prepare them for employment.

# 1.2.6 Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice" If 'yes', how does the institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?

While the affiliating University prescribes the content and duration of the regular courses, a student has the choice of combining these conventional courses with courses in the Distance Modes of Education. It is left for the student to avail himself of the flexibility in the system by choosing the courses/combination of his/her choice. On its part the institution provides flexible timings by conducting the distance education classes on Sundays and during regular holidays or vacation. The Distance Education Mode is preferred by such students who are employed on a part-time or full-time basis and still pursue through the Dr.B.R.Ambedkar Open University Study Centre in our college. Students from economically weaker sections, who are employed and can't attend a regular course, those that are advanced in years and students who have dropped-out from regular college courses have the flexibility to pursue a course of their choice according to their plan.

#### 1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

## 1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

As an affiliated college of Krishna University the college follows the curriculum framed by the Boards of Studies and also following the guidelines of APSCHE and UGC. The College was started with the mission of providing education to the youth from agrarian background and to cater to the societal needs by shaping them to be leaders in their chosen fields. The college has been providing quality education to the students and preparing them for the changing times by starting need based courses from time to time. Thus when there was demand in the 1990s the college started Computers and Electronics course in B.Sc., and introduced MBA in the year 1993 and several other PG courses. While some courses had to be closed down due to lack of demand, some other courses were revived on need basis.

The students have a provision for enrolling themselves in NSS, NCC, Eco-Club, Women Development Centre, Red Ribbon Club for community service and extension activities.

The college has been at the forefront in organising special lectures on Ethics in Public Life.

Curriculum-based educational tours/ field-visits were organised for Biology students and Industrial Study Tours are organized by the Department of Business Administration.

In addition to giving the required training in Computers the College has been providing free internet facility to the students and this helps the student to gain confidence and equips them to gain knowledge of the employment markets and to compete in them.

ICT based teaching aids in the Seminar Halls and Language Laboratory help the teachers and the taught in the teaching learning process.

Faculty Development Programmes, Extension Lectures, Endowment Lectures help in stimulating the minds of the learners. Thus the College has been providing ample opportunities for a student's advancement.

## 1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

To cater to the global and national employment demands the UGC, APSCHE and the affiliating university revise the theoretical and practical components in under graduate courses. They provide a complementary provision for field visits, case studies, surveys, hands-on experience, project-works etc.

Training is also given in communication skills to enable students communicate freely and confidently. The Tally programme in B.Com and M.Com equips the students to secure jobs in industrial houses as Accounting Managers, Income tax Consultants, etc.

Similarly Distance Education offered in the college, provides employed people, a chance to pursue higher studies and to aspire for promotions or higher jobs.

## 1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

There is a Women Development Centre in the College to look after the rights of girl students and women staff. It organises Guest Lectures, Medical check-ups and such other activities to help women.

Environmental education has been a compulsory subject and it helps in promoting environmental awareness in the students and staff. Military training is provided by two wings of NCC. The NSS unit instills a sense of service into the students. The College has a Red Ribbon Club to bring awareness on AIDS. The Akkineni Kalapeetam helps in the cultural training of our students. Free internet facility in all the departments and the internet centre makes the staff and students ICT savvy.

The Grievance Redressal Cell solves the grievances of students and there is a Students' Charter to cater to the needs of the students in a time bound manner. Thus the institution integrates the cross cutting issues into the curriculum.

## 1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

#### Moral and ethical values

The compulsory subject in "Human Values and Professional Ethics" provides the students opportunities for self development, honesty in approach and hard-work which leads to an ethical life in society gaining the proper respect.

## > Employable and life skills

Further the practical approach and ICT skills acquired in the College makes a student employable.

## > Better career options

Our students have a choice of going for employment with the training they have gained from the theoretical knowledge coupled with practical skills. Through the problem solving exercises, field visits, surveys, industrial tours, project works etc. they can enhance their chances in employability. Thus the training both in knowledge and skill development enhances their competence to face the job scenario.

## **Community Orientation**

Our NCC and NSS wings instill a sense of service into the students. Our students rose to the occasion whenever there was a call for assistance, either for "Save the Little Hearts" or the "Victims of Cyclone hit areas". The Red Ribbon Club brings awareness on AIDS and we also organize programmes of creating Voter Awareness.

## 1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

#### Students' feedback

Students' feedback in the format provided by the Commissioner of Collegiate Education, Andhra Pradesh is obtained and depending on the suggestions made it is taken to the notice of the appropriate authorities.

#### Alumni

The Alumni Association of the College obtains feedback on curriculum and provides the necessary books, scholarships to the students.

#### Peers

The College obtains feedback from academic peers on curriculum during the invited guest lectures and seminars.

## **Employers/Industries**

The Career Counselling Cell organises seminars, counselling programmes with individuals, companies and solicits their feedback on the curriculum.

The feedback thus obtained is used by the college to enrich the curriculum by organizing:

- Guest Lectures
- Soft skills training
- Lectures on ethics in public life
- ICT skill orientation

## 1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The Principal and the Internal Quality Assurance Cell of the College form various academic and administrative committees to take care of the activities in the college. Necessary enrichment programmes for the students and staff are conducted under the auspices of IQAC during the academic year. The institution makes sure that the programmes offered help the students in curricular, extra-curricular and co-curricular activities. Feedback is obtained at the end of each programme to help in evaluating and updating the quality of the enrichment programmes.

The enrichment programmes help the students improve their communication skills, analytical skills, computer skills and social skills. These are conducted as short term programmes and the students' performance at the end of the programme is one yardstick to evaluate their quality. Moreover, the staff handling such enrichment programmes continuously monitor the students in the class room to estimate their impact. The ultimate test of these programmes is the performance of the student in a test conducted at the end of the programme. Based on the students' performance and their suggestions/requirements necessary modifications are made in the enrichment programmes from time to time.

## 1.4 Feedback System

## 1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

The College is a non-autonomous institution and cannot design the curriculum on its own. The curricula for different courses are framed by the Boards of Studies of different subjects and approved by the Academic Council of the University. However a large number of our senior teachers including the Principal are serving as the Chair Persons of the Academic Boards of Studies and Academic Senate. Their ideas, suggestions are taken into consideration in framing modules, preparing model papers, in drafting evaluation procedures etc. Thus the teachers of our college have been taking active part in the designing and development of the curriculum.

## 1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

The College has a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on curriculum. The feedback thus obtained by the College is analyzed. The teachers from this college who are members of Boards of Studies, Syllabus Committees, and Academic Councils of the Krishna University take these suggestions to the notice of the

appropriate authorities. There have been specific occasions when the errors in the question paper setting have been taken to the notice of the authorities for redressal.

## 1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?)

Keeping in tune with the demands for B.Sc. (Computers) and B.Com. (Computers) courses, two sections were started in the self-financed wing of the college. Similarly M.Sc. Mathematics was revived from 2014-15 while M.Sc. Computers and M.Sc. Physics Courses were revived from the academic year 2015-16.

## Any other relevant information regarding curricular aspects which the college would like to include.

- ➤ The College has been starting need based programmes. Thus Statistics combination in B.Sc., and B.Com., have been introduced in self-financed courses.
- ➤ The College has also been reviving courses as per the societal need. Thus admissions in B.A. were revived during 2013-14 academic year, M.Sc. Mathematics was revived in 2013-14, M.Sc. Physics and M.Sc. Computer Science in 2015-16.
- ➤ Realizing the need for giving training to students in ICT the College has created a free internet centre which can be used from 8AM to 8PM and Wi-Fi facility is also available in select places in the college.
- ➤ Though the B.Sc. (CBZ) course had to be discontinued due to lack of demand and the admission norms of the Commssionerate of Collegiate Education, Government of Andhra Pradesh, the Biology Museum is maintained carefully to expose students of various courses of our college and the students coming from other colleges.

## CRITERION II: TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION

#### 2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

## 2.1.1 How does the College ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

### **Publicity in the Admission Process**

The College ensures publicity in the admission process by newspaper notification and local electronic media. Our website also displays the courses offered in the college.

The prospectus is available to the students along with the application. All relevant information regarding the admission procedure is printed in the college prospectus.

The admission notification is also displayed on the College notice boards, providing detailed and related information about the process of admission.

## **Transparency in the Admission Process**

The admission process is totally transparent and applications are invited in advance. Where there is more demand, the list of applicants is prepared according to merit and displayed on the college notice boards. Further, phone calls are also made to students who registered their mobile number in the college office. The Government prescribed norms relating to reservation is strictly followed. Transparency is ensured from the stage of sales of applications to the stage of completion of admission process. Our endeavour throughout has been to ensure access to all those who desire to seek admission. Under the guidance of the Principal the Admission Committee conducts admissions to various courses in UG. For PG courses admissions are conducted by the University Admissions Committee based on the ranks of the students in the Common Entrance Tests.

# 2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other to various programmes of the Institution.

For General UG courses (B.A., B.Sc., B.Com. Courses) the admission is based on merit i.e. marks scored at the + 2 (Intermediate or equivalent) qualifying examination and also on the reservation guidelines of the Andhra Pradesh State Government.

For PG courses the admissions are based on the Krishna University Common Entrance Test Rank. For MBA admissions, the rank obtained in the State Level ICET examination is the basis.

**Certificate Courses:** The aptitude of the students is the basis for admission into the Certificate Courses and Add-on Courses conducted by the college.

# 2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the College and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

The minimum marks for admission at the entry level for each programme is 40%. The following table shows the students with the maximum percentage for admission in each course. Generally merit students are given preference in all the courses offered by the college. The college follows the broad guidelines of the state government and the guidelines of the affiliating University.

Comparison with other colleges of the affiliating University within the district for the years 2014-15, 2015-16 have been provided below:

## 2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes', what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Yes, there is a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process. Each year the admission committee reviews the admission process. Based on the admissions of the previous years and the profiles of the student maintained annually necessary steps are taken for streamlining the admission process. In the months of January and February our teachers visit the Junior Colleges in neighbouring mandals to explain the facilities in our college. The students are also enlightened about the number of scholarships available for students in our college. Where some students are unable to produce the required supporting documents they are given guidance. In some cases financial assistance is also provided to students.

This student friendly approach and providing all information related to admission in the college displayed in the notice boards has resulted in a positive outcome over the years. We follow a single window system for streamlining the admission process. The teachers on the admissions committee also function as a helpdesk. The smooth, hassle free mechanism in admissions is utilised by the applicants and their parents.

# 2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion.

The college is situated in an agrarian setting. A large number of students belong to the SC/ST, OBC, Women, Economically-weaker section and Minority community.

The College is committed to implementing access to all the students of the above categories and more than 80% of the students are from these categories. Thus the admissions of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the national commitment to diversity and inclusion.

#### (a) Students from SC/ST/OBC communities:






## (b) Women:

## (c) Differently-abled:

Every year there are students from the differently abled category in various courses. The College organizes its classes in such a way as to make it convenient for the differently-abled students to attend the classes.

## (d) Economically-weaker sections:

A large number of students studying in the college come from economically-weaker sections. Most of these students get a social welfare scholarship from the government. Where such students fail to get a scholarship the scholarships committee allocates financial assistance on Merit-cum-Means basis and each year the college provides about Rs.1,00,000/- worth of such scholarships. Some of our students also work during holidays and vacation to meet their education expenditure.

#### (e) Any other:

There are a number of students hailing from forward communities and unable to get scholarships of the government. There have been instances where our staff members have paid the tuition fee and examination fees of such students.

As the trends shown in the table point out that there is an increase in demand for B.Sc (MPC), B.Sc (MPCS) courses and marginal decrease in demand for B.Com and B.A courses. This is in consonance with the needs of society and industry. The College has been reviving courses from time to time based on the societal demands.

### 2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs of Students

## 2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

In order to facilitate the differently-abled students the College changes class rooms for such students to the ground floor to help them reach the classes without much difficulty.

# 2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

The college conducts a week long training programme for the benefit of freshers. Before the commencement of regular classes these students assemble in the Seminar Hall and are addressed by the Principal and other senior staff members, the lecturer in Physical Education, the NCC, NSS and Akkineni Kalapeetam coordinators. Depending on their inclination, merit and performance in the previous courses of study they are guided for co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. Students who need additional coaching in soft skills are also guided on the facilities available in the college.

Such interaction of the teachers with the students before the commencement of the teaching programme has come in handy in assessing the inclinations, knowledge base and skills of the students. It has also helped the teachers to individually identify the strengths and weaknesses of students.

The Department of English has been identifying students in such meetings for the distribution of free text books in the English Language Laboratory.

Thus various measures are taken for assessing the students' knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programmes offered in the college.

# 2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge /Remedial /Add-on / Enrichment Courses, etc.)

To bridge the knowledge gap of the new students several measures are taken:

- For instance, those students who are incomputerate and need to familiarize themselves with typing skills, type writers are provided.
- Further they are guided to utilise the facilities in the computer laboratories to learn typing and using the internet.
- The Certificate Course in English and Absolute Beginners English courses

- offered by the Department of English help to reinforce the students' knowledge of English.
- Attempts are made to identify slow learners in the classes and they are given additional inputs.
- ➤ Since most of the students come from a telugu medium background the bilingual explanations are used in the classroom lectures and discussions.
- ➤ Concept clarification is done by the Arts, Commerce and Science faculty members.
- ➤ The Department of Mathematics helps the students by giving them problem solving exercises in the practical hours.
- > Remedial classes are organized for slow learners.
- ➤ Where possible the students are provided simplified study material in addition to the prescribed academy books and the standard reference books.
- > Revision of topics is done before terminal examinations.
- ➤ Class tests are conducted to find out if the students are able to cope with the subject and the teaching pace.
- > There are theory, tutorial and practical classes in almost all the departments.

## 2.2.4 How does the College sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

- ➤ The College has a Women Development Centre (WDC). It works for empowerment of women by bringing out handouts, showing PPTs, and organizing guest lectures and seminars. It takes up social causes and organizes meeting and rallies. It also provides awareness to women students by inviting lady doctors for delivering lectures.
- ➤ A statutory cell to redress the grievances of students is also formed in the college and it meets periodically. All sections of people are included in decision making.
- ➤ Inclusion promotes quality and equity education for all, without any type of barrier or exclusion, including those who may be potentially marginalized due to disability, gender, family background, poverty etc.
- The Eco Club undertakes such activities as sapling plantation, reducing pollution, creating awareness among students on protecting the environment. It also invites people with the necessary expertise to give power point presentations and deliver guest lectures.

## 2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational / learning needs of advanced learners?

The college identifies the special needs of advanced learners. Each faculty member in his/her turn gives additional guidance and also recommends the names of these students to the Principal. They are provided:

- > Special books, reference material and access to the internet in the departments on need basis.
- ➤ They are given special coaching for taking part in the seminars, competitions organised by other colleges.

- Extra classes are also organized to help them resolve issues.
- > They are given assignments to bring out their talent on current and latest topics.
- > Such students are encouraged to give seminars on selected topics in the classes and to train their peers.

# 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?

The College monitors the attendance and academic performance of the students. The parents of those students who are irregular or academically weak are invited to the college for interaction with the concerned staff members and the Principal. If a student is irregular to class lectures, or class tests, it is reflected in the progress report sent after monthly/quarterly etc. examinations. Slow learners and students from economically weaker sections are identified and proper encouragement is given to such students to minimize their dropout rate.

## **Disadvantaged sections of society:**

There is a provision for giving government scholarship to the students from disadvantaged sections of society. They are also provided hostel facilities depending on their caste/community. Fee concessions are also provided to such students.

## **Slow learners:**

For the benefit of slow learners the faculty members also use bilingual explanations in their classes. The teachers also conduct discussions in the classes to help the slow learners.

Special classes and remedial classes are also conducted for the benefit of slow learners. Further they are given home assignments on need basis to monitor their progress.

## **Economically weaker sections:**

In addition to the bus and train concessions to students, free books, Merit-cum-Means scholarships and financial assistance from the student welfare fund are provided. Meritorious students from these sections are given travel allowance for participating in sports, seminars and competitions organized by other colleges.

#### 2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

# 2.3.1 How does the College plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)?

The College Council consisting of the Principal and all the in-charges of departments prepare an Academic Calendar before the commencement of the

academic year. The working days and examinations mentioned in the calendar are followed for instructions, examinations and evaluation purposes.

## Teaching plan

In addition to the college calendar the academic calendar prepared by the Commissionerate of Collegiate Education, Government of Andhra Pradesh is also followed for guidance on state level events. The plan generally draws attention to the dead-line for completion of monthly, quarterly, half-yearly and annual schedules. This enables the students to know the academic programme and the schedule of the examinations. Moreover, the teachers would know the time frame for teaching-learning process and ensure the total attention for the completion of syllabi and possible revision.

Every teacher draws his/her teaching plan taking into consideration the number of working days in each term, the number of topics to be covered and the pace of learning of the students. The academic calendar also enables the faculty to monitor the students and to make necessary corrections to the teaching schedule. The in-charges of the departments countersign the teaching diaries of the faculty and they also make necessary suggestions in the departmental meetings.

### **Evaluation of Blue print**

In the beginning of the year itself, the year end public examination pattern is provided to the students. In fact all the departments and the library keep copies of the old question papers for the guidance of the students. The faculty members provide the students information relating to the evaluation procedures.

The Examination Committee in consultation with the Principal prepares the time frame for conducting the examinations. The Principal also gives the time frame for completing the evaluation and announcing marks in the class and entering them in the marks register in the college office. This enables the teachers and the taught to know the time frame for completion of the process of evaluation and results. If for any reason a student fails to attend the regular examination, the department / the faculty member conducts a re-examination or gives an assignment to find out how the student is learning and coping with studies.

The schedule of the College Pre-Public examinations and the University Practical and Theory Examinations is given in the calendar at the beginning of the year for the guidance of the students.

Thus efforts are made to make the teaching-learning-evaluation procedure systematic and in consonance with the planning, and implementation of the scheme of university-schedule.

## 2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

IQAC plans and supports effective implementation for Total Quality Management for teaching-learning process for all stakeholders. It contributes to improve the teaching-learning process by:

- ➤ Planning and encouraging teachers to use more teaching aids to improve the teaching-learning process and encourage innovative practices.
- > Supporting the organization of more seminars, workshops etc. to spread awareness on academic and social issues.
- Arranging for improving the system of teachers' evaluation by students with a view to improve the overall quality of the College.

## **Further the IQAC:**

- ➤ Plans and actively participates in enhancing the infrastructural facilities in terms of space, equipment, laboratories, libraries etc.
- Facilitates support for Faculty Development Programmes and research activities.
- ➤ The faculty members explain the students about the curriculum objectives and the way their learning outcomes are tested in evaluation.
- Appreciates, encourages and provides support required by all staff for their quality sustenance and quality improvement in teaching, research and administration.

# 2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

- A college is for catering to the needs of student community. The teachers are given all facilities to update their own knowledge and skills by taking part in the orientation / refresher courses and by participating in the seminars / workshops of different kinds. The teachers in turn use this training and experience to adapt a student-centric approach in teaching-learning-evaluation.
- ➤ The support structures available for teachers include: instructional material like audio-visual facilities for teaching, computer-based teaching methods, smart-classrooms, fully computerized libraries, free internet access, well equipped laboratories, support for organizing seminars, debates, guest-lectures by involving senior retired lecturers of our college, calling experts from other colleges, Universities etc.
- ➤ The teachers are given free hand to organize orientation classes for the freshers for one week duration before the regular date of commencement of classes. In these classes the students are informed about the requirements of the respective courses and the infrastructure available on the campus. They are given

information about the fee concessions, scholarships, awards, facilities and infrastructure available. The facility for sports, NCC and NSS available in the college groom the students in physical fitness, discipline, leadership and service and prepares them for the national requirements. Each class is assigned to the care of one or two teachers who monitor the attendance and the academic performance of the students.

- ➤ Where the teachers find irregularity on the part of the students, the parents are called and counselling is done to improve the students. The academically weaker students are given additional support by the respective teachers. In some cases the meritorious students from that class are asked to help the weaker students in improving his/her performance by collaborative learning.
- ➤ Similarly students are made into small groups in a class for practical classes or for project works / seminar presentations / audio or video presentations and they collaborate with one another to improve their learning collectively or individually.
- ➤ Where there is a need for a student to work independently the teachers take up the responsibility of explaining the subject till the student is able to follow the concepts and pursue his study on his own. Special fund for organizing remedial classes helps the teachers in coaching the academically weaker students. Career guidance and placement cell helps the students who aspire to appear for different types of competitive examinations.

## 2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The College encourages students to develop their communication skills, independent and analytical thinking. The teachers keep on informing the students that whatever they learn in the class room situation has to be used in a societal situation. The students are encouraged to cultivate critical thinking and how their education can be used for individual or social benefit. The class room learning is but a key for opening life-long learning opportunities. In addition to this, students are guided to inculcate a research temper and use their creativity by:

- > Assignments for individual development
- ➤ Correlation of theoretical and practical classes with scientific poster presentations and preparation of models.
- > Department level exhibitions by students relating to particular subjects.
- > Organizing seminars and lectures based on curricula.
- > Participation in Seminars and Workshops
- > Project based work for students.
- ➤ Use of Internet
- ➤ Visit to industries for real life on-site experience

The college has a Career Guidance and Placement Cell which conducts coaching to students. Remedial coaching classes are arranged for socio-economically backward students. There is a grievance redressal cell for attending to any complaints of the students and there are welfare measures like free books, payment of tuition fee to support students who are financially disadvantaged.

The institution has effective mechanism to make the students learn through participation in community services through extension programmes under NSS and NCC. The college offers value-based education, which helps the student community throughout their life, for inculcating social responsibilities. The Akkineni Kalapeetam encourages the students to learn how to participate in various cultural activities to foster their holistic personality developments.

# 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The faculty members use lecture method, interactive method, audio-visual mode of teaching, computer-assisted teaching, project based work, teaching by organizing seminars based on the curriculum. Several departments have downloaded NPTEL material and such other educational resources.

Similarly the Virtual Labs which enthuse students to conduct experiments are also used by the science departments.

Likewise the e-learning resources available are also accessed by our staff and made use of on need basis.

## 2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

There are opportunities for the teachers and students to keep pace with new developments in their subjects.

Extension lectures / seminars are organized on regular basis by all the departments to update their knowledge. Information about the latest developments in different subject areas is presented in seminars on current issues organized periodically in the college. Prominent people and scholars are invited to share their knowledge for the benefit of the students.

Students are given various assignments including writing articles and preparation of posters, contributions to the college magazine, interacting with resource persons during seminars, workshops etc. They are also encouraged to present class room seminars on recent developments. Such interactions are beneficial to the students and the faculty.

The PG Department of Business Administration conducts project work which is a part of their curriculum. Some of the departments like Economics, Physics, Chemistry and History organize study visits to acquaint the students with real life examples.

The College libraries are well stocked with various journals related to different subjects. In addition to the books, magazines, newspapers available, libraries also have internet connectivity to download e-journals or e-articles relating to the latest advancements in a particular field.

The College has central internet centre, separate computer laboratories for UG and PG students, four e-class rooms with smart board facility.

To keep pace with developments in their respective disciplines the faculty members participate in international / national seminars, workshops, short term courses, refresher courses and orientation programmes.

Some of our staff members are also invited as Resource Persons for various seminars and workshops. These activities strengthen the involvement of teachers in curricular activities and the resultant benefits are passed on to the student community.

Several teachers are involved in research guidance and this work goes on along with regular teaching. There are other teachers who have registered themselves for research and both these activities help the faculty to keep pace with the recent developments in various subjects.

## 2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \ benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counselling / mentoring / academic advice) provided to students?

Academic support in the college begins with the orientation classes organized for applicants for PGCET and ICET during summer vacation. Intensive coaching is given to students from our college or from other colleges for the Common Entrance Tests (CET).

Similarly the freshers joining the college are given orientation for about a week at the beginning of the academic year.

Even during the time of admissions, students are given guidance regarding the programme of study they can opt for as some of the B.Sc. and B.Com. programme aspirants are undecided either to go for the restructured or the regular programme.

Students are guided to plan in advance about their career / job options and they are also given coaching by the faculty or by utilizing the services of professionals, doctors and academic and career counsellors.

Personal and psycho-social support is provided to students by the Management, staff members, the alumni association (ANRCOSA) to the needy students. Counselling is given to students to sort out their problems by the senior teachers. Career Guidance and Placement Cell provides guidance to the students to acquire different skills which include:

- Numerical ability
- Communication Skills
- General Knowledge
- Reasoning
- Computer Skills (including typing)
- Facing Interviews

These help the students cope better while applying for a job, attending a competitive examination or an interview. Guidance is provided to students for taking part in sports, cultural, NCC and NSS activities at the college, university, state and national levels.

Students of SC/ST background desirous of going abroad for higher studies are provided information circulated by Social Welfare Department about the availability of coaching for different competitive examinations.

# 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

- > Student engagement is key to learning. Keeping this in mind our teachers handle their classes using illustrations or experiments, particularly by science teachers.
- ➤ Project based / activity based learning, field work, visits to industries, socioeconomic surveys, student seminars based on the curriculum are some of the approaches taken up by the faculty for teaching. They also use interactive method, audio-visual mode of teaching and computer-assisted learning.
- Faculty members are encouraged to use computer assisted teaching using the resources downloaded from the internet, use of LCD projector to enthuse the students much more.
- > Such approaches raise the spirit of students and make them feel happy about the session.
- ➤ These approaches result in increasing the attention and curiosity of the students and leave the teachers with satisfaction.

## 2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

- Latest books and magazines are purchased by the College libraries on regular basis for knowledge up-gradation.
- > The libraries subscribe to various journals related to different subjects.
- ➤ Newspapers and e-journals on the internet are made available to library users to help them keep track of the latest advancements in a particular field.
- > Separate periodical sections are available in the libraries.
- > Special provision is made for keeping books related to competitive examinations to assist students preparing for competitions.

- ➤ Old question papers in all the subjects are made available to the students and since both the libraries are equipped with Xerox facility they can take copies of any material from the library.
- ➤ Copies of syllabi prescribed by the university, with question paper pattern / model etc. are also available to students for ready reference.
- > The library staff updates the faculty and the students regarding latest acquisitions.
- New titles are displayed on the display boards at the entrance of the library.
- > Several departments have Departmental Libraries for the benefit of faculty and students.
- > Special provision is made in the annual library budget to procure books in the annual book exhibition which is held at Vijayawada, to which faculty members also take students for the purchase of books.
- ➤ The college libraries also provide the staff and students the list of journals that can be accessed through the library login.
- > Several publications like those from World Bank are also downloaded and made available to the staff and students.
- ➤ The UG Library also has a good collection of G.Os. relating to service conditions of the employees.

# 2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

A.N.R. College is an institution receiving grant-in-aid from the government of Andhra Pradesh. There are also some courses offered on self-financed basis and the staff for these courses are appointed and paid by the Management. But in the aided stream, over the years, a large number of staff retired from service and the consequent vacancies have not been filled up for want of permission from State government. Some of the aided departments don't have any staff and some have only a single member. Due to shortage of staff some problems are encountered in completing the syllabi. But the institution has been recruiting temporary and guest lecturers to meet this shortage to complete the syllabi in time. Where possible, the services of retired staff members are also taken to complete the syllabus.

Wherever required the faculty members also take special classes during Sundays and other holidays to complete the curriculum in time.

To help slow learners the college also provides them remedial classes to enable them catch-up with other students.

## 2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The college monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching learning through IQAC which collects feedback from students. On the basis of such feedback the IQAC monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching-learning. These are

analyzed and evaluated, and the reports are utilized by the Principal for need based correction and improvement to teachers and also for encouragement of the staff. The evaluation helps the individual teachers to understand their strengths and weaknesses, leading to overall improvement of the teaching-learning process.

The Principal also convenes regular meetings with the in-charges of departments and also with the staff members to take their feedback on the teaching-learning progress of each department.

The IQAC and the Staff Council also take care of any issues related to the quality of teaching-learning.

## 2.4 Teacher Quality

The regular faculty members are employed as per the norms and conditions of UGC, the State government and the affiliating University. Even for employing the temporary and guest faculty members the same eligibility norms are applied. Appointment and promotion of teachers including the Principal is made in accordance with the provisions of UGC norms and the State government orders

In certain departments, where regular faculty members retire and new recruitment is not possible the Management appoints temporary faculty/ guest faculty following the rules laid down by the University and the Department of Higher Education, Government of Andhra Pradesh.

To retain the temporary faculty/guest faculty the college provides them regular increments, PF facility, opportunities for enrolling for research etc.

# 2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

There is a great demand for teachers in Sciences, Statistics, Commerce and Management. The College has been making efforts to recruit faculty and train them to meet the needs of students as per the demands of respective courses. During the last three academic years the appointments are made in the departments like Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, PG Commerce, Computer Science and PG Dept. of Business Administration. These faculty members are appointed as temporary/guest faculty as per the norms of the Commissionerate of Collegiate Education, AICTE and the affiliating University. The College pays salary to these staff from the fees received in self-financing courses and through Management share where necessary.

# 2.4.3 Providing details on staff development programmes during the last four years elaborate on the strategies adopted by the institution in enhancing the teacher quality.

Staff development must be intentional, active, and individual growth should reflect current personal and professional status to perform assigned duties, short and long-term goals. They should help in the improvement of the institution. Both individual and institutional needs are included in this plan. With this view the College encourages its faculty members to attend training programmes, orientations, seminars, workshops etc. and the number of staff nominated to these programmes during the last four years is shown below:

Faculty Training programmes are organized by the institution to empower and enable the use of various tools and technology for improved teaching-learning.

### > Teaching learning methods/approaches:

Resource persons from other institutions, Universities are invited to deliver lectures on the Teaching-Learning methods that can be implemented.

### **Handling new curriculum:**

When there are changes in the curriculum or when a new curriculum is introduced by the University, workshops and guest lectures are conducted for updating our college staff. Similarly the Principal and staff members attend the meetings convened by the University to update themselves on the new curriculum.

## > Content/knowledge management:

Content management involves creating, editing and publishing material which will benefit the faculty members in getting a clear picture of the scope of the subject, and in the students an understanding of the topics prescribed. The faculty prepare the content for the benefit of the students.

## > Selection, development and use of enrichment materials:

While the individual departments develop enrichment material related to their subject, the career guidance and placement cell selects, develops and uses material to train students appear for competitive examinations.

#### > Assessment:

The faculty members use formative assessment and summative assessments. Formative assessments gives an early feedback on the knowledge and understanding of students and it also helps students identify for themselves if they can answer in brief questions asked in a class room with a few sentences. Summative assessment evaluates a student's learning at the end of a unit or a semester or a term and helps the teachers and the students about the changes to be incorporated in learning styles.

## > Cross cutting issues:

College education is not complete till awareness on HIV/AIDS, protection of the environment and gender sensitivity is imparted to the students along with the prescribed course of study. These are called cross-cutting issues because they can't be seen in isolation, as they influence all sectors of society including the education sector. With a view to make students responsible citizens the college offers them information on these areas. If these issues are not tackled, the success in other sectors will be very limited and hence the college creates proper awareness on HIV/AIDS, the need for protecting the environment etc.

### **➤** Audio Visual Aids/multimedia:

Audio aids are used in English Language Laboratory for teaching correct pronunciation and intonation. In addition to the regular visual aids like charts, writing on the black boards, pictures, models, text books etc. the computer aided visual presentations, virtual labs etc. are used to make students understand lessons and concept easily. They also make teaching more effective and involve all types of students.

### > OER's:

Open Educational Resources are also used for the benefit of students.

## > Teaching learning material development, selection and use:

We are aware that good teaching includes teaching students how to learn, how to remember, how to think, and how to motivate themselves. The goal of a teacher is to teach students "what" to learn and teaching students "how" to learn. While the text books are the primary source there are other materials used by the teachers in our college. Depending on the need for teaching a particular subject /topic / unit / chapter, our teachers have prepared different materials which include models (atomic structure, bonding), charts (IPA sounds), visual displays using computers and LCD etc. They are used in the classroom or in the laboratories. Further the IQAC also provides the faculty a list of OER material available on the web.

  - ➤ The College encourages research aptitude among the teachers and students. The IQAC motivates the teachers for taking up research or acting as research guides. It also assists teachers to apply to UGC for research projects
  - ➤ The management provides study leave to complete Ph.D and M.Phil. research work.
  - Leave / OD facility and financial grant is sanctioned to faculty members to

- present research papers in national/international conferences, seminars and workshops.
- ➤ Necessary infrastructure and management contribution is provided to organize National/ International/State Level Seminars, Workshops and Lectures.
- Adjustments are also made in the work allotted in the time table of teachers who go for such research oriented activities.
- ➤ The College faculty also undertook minor/major research projects as research fellows. Some faculty members also act as guides for Ph.D. and M.Phil. students in various Universities in the State and outside the State. Some faculty members also serve as adjudicators for research papers which are published in peer reviewed journals.
- ➤ The Management is committed to promote research and ensures professional development of the faculty. The MBA Department undertakes tours to industrial establishments to guide the students and also to gain insight into the working of industries.

- 2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?
  - The College follows the norms of Commissionerate of Collegiate Education (CCE), Government of Andhra Pradesh for the evaluation of the teachers by

the students. The IQAC obtains feedback from the students teacher-wise and it is analyzed course-wise. The model questionnaire issued by the NAAC and the CCE are merged and used to prepare the feedback form for this purpose. IQAC gives the analyzed evaluative reports teacher-wise to the Principal and this is also placed on the CCE website <a href="http://www.apcce.gov.in/academicaudit.aspx">http://www.apcce.gov.in/academicaudit.aspx</a>. The Principal also informs individual teachers the outcome of the feedback for encouragement, necessary modifications and future improvement. The outcome of the evaluation helps the teachers in understanding their own strengths and weaknesses.

### **Evaluation of teachers by the external Peers**

The Commissionerate of Collegiate Education, Govt. of Andhra Pradesh sends a team every year to the College for evaluating all administrative and academic affairs including teachers. Their feedback on systems, procedures and teachers is used for corrective measures.

The visiting Professors and experts coming to the College during Workshops / Seminars/Conferences interact with teachers and give appropriate suggestions and this also serves as informal external evaluation of teachers by the external peers. The teachers are evaluated while applying for career advancement by the subject experts from the University and Officials sent by the Department of Higher Education.

All these evaluations are used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process. They also help faculty to know about their strengths and remedial measures to be taken for overcoming their shortcomings.

#### 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

## 2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

- ➤ Information about the question paper pattern, evaluation methods and the examination schedule is given to the faculty members who in turn pass them on to the students at the time of orientation after admission of freshers and in the respective classes from time to time.
- The evaluation procedures can be used by students to demonstrate their mastery of academic content. The faculty informs the students about appropriate methods used by the University in conducting science practicals where outside experts are sent by the University. The evaluation of public examination papers is done in spot valuation conducted by the University. The students are informed about the possibility of applying for revaluation, personal verification of the answer scripts and this makes the evaluation more objective and error free.
- Regular information, notifications regarding examinations are circulated to staff members and also displayed on the College notice boards for information and transparency of the teaching-learning and evaluation process.

## 2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The Krishna University to which the college is affiliated introduced CBCS pattern at the UG level from the academic year 2015-16 following the UGC recommendations. In CBCS pattern 25% of marks are allotted for internal evaluation of UG students like the one existing for PG students, which would help in the continuous evaluation of students. The break up for internal evaluation is 5 marks for attendance, 5 marks for assignment, 5 marks for classroom seminar and 10 marks for the average of two internal examinations to be conducted in a semester.

The college is an affiliated college and hence can't implement any reforms in evaluation on its own. But the faculty members create situations in classes where students undergo peer evaluation while presenting seminars. This process requires peers to comment about the performance of one another and provide feedback on individual and group assignments. Peer evaluation serves to increase motivation and enhance the learning process.

## 2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

Several faculty members have been serving as Chief Examiners and Examiners in spot valuation. They strive to see that the evaluation guidelines are adhered to during spot valuation.

The college also served as a Spot Valuation Centre and took several mistakes in the question papers given in the public examinations to the notice of the higher authorities of the University to see that remedial measures are implemented.

Thus on several occasions moderation was given by the university on the basis of the points identified by the faculty members of our college. Our college staff also wrote to the University regarding the errors in question papers given by the university and asked for corrective measures. Very recently, after the introduction of CBCS pattern at the UG level our college organized a Workshop with the assistance of RUSA and Commissionerate of Collegiate Education, Government of Andhra Pradesh, on Academic Reforms aimed Workshop on "Standardizing Question Paper Setting under CBCS Pattern" on 27-8-2015. Such workshop is a pioneering initiative of our college which has not been taken up anywhere in Andhra Pradesh. Question Banks relating to thirty subjects have been prepared by teachers who came from three Universities and these were sent to the University, Commissionerate of Collegiate Education, AP and also placed on the website of the college <a href="https://www.anrcollege.edu">www.anrcollege.edu</a>. Such initiatives of the college and its faculty members have helped the student community also.

## 2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

Formative assessment helps to monitor students' learning and provides ongoing feedback to teachers to adjust their teaching to the level required by the students to improve their learning. Formative assessments have been used in the college to:

- > Help students identify their strengths and weaknesses and target areas that need work
- > Help faculty recognize where students are struggling and address their problems immediately.

Formative assessment is used as a trial run for the final or summative assessment by an external agency / examiner. So the faculty members have used formative assessments as a chance of correcting/modifying their methods of teaching (using slower and repetitive explanations for helping all types of students) and the students to enhance their performance to the required level. Our teachers have guided students to modify their presentations, answers suitably to perform better during summative assessment.

Summative assessment is used to evaluate student learning at the end of an instructional unit or during a mid semester/term exam, a final project. On the basis of the summative assessments students can join subsequent courses. Summative assessment / evaluation is typically quantitative, using numeric scores or letter grades to assess learner achievement and they are the basis for job interviews or admission into higher courses.

Based on the summative assessment the college has adopted remedial teaching for the benefit of the students.

# 2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)

Results of class tests, mid-term tests are regularly announced in the class rooms and based on the results in annual examination the students are addressed individually regarding their performance and need for improvement. The valued answer scripts are shown to the students to let them find out their own mistakes and suggestions are given to improve their performance.

Under CBCS as part of internal assessment, students are required to present a seminar in the class and submit an assignment in each subject. These are helpful to identify the successful students and those requiring improvement.

For the high achievers value addition material is provided for independent learning.

Those with better communication skills are identified for grooming them for different competitions.

Others are encouraged to develop themselves on the model of the successful students.

## 2.5.6 What are the graduates attributes specified by the college / affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

In order to become a graduate, a student is expected to prove that:

- ➤ He has fair knowledge in his subject which is tested in the public examinations.
- ➤ He should be capable of self learning and capable of applying his knowledge outside the class room i.e. in a job market.
- ➤ He should realize his social responsibility, need for protecting the environment, issues of equity and inclusion, gender discrimination and the like.
- ➤ He should be law abiding with good moral sense and the college strives to inculcate these qualities among students through the prescribed curriculum and the co-curricular activities.

The College has been encouraging students to be skilled in the subject, filled with investigative temper, independent and critical thinking by giving them value addition. Resourceful and effective communicators among students are groomed for representing the college in different University and State level competitions. The confident, adaptable, responsible and collaborative students are recommended for employment.

To sum—up, the college instills its students with the capacity for self-learning, employable traits and good citizen qualities.

## 2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

After each class test, the performance of the students is analyzed in the class room and any individual doubts, grievances are addressed appropriately, and this continues in all internal examinations of the college. The valued answer scripts are returned to students to let them see their drawbacks and mistakes and suggestions are given to improve their performance.

In the final examination students have to approach the affiliating university following the rules and regulations for redressal of grievances regarding evaluation. The students have the chance to apply for revaluation, personal verification by paying the prescribed fees. The College forwards the applications of the students for re-valuation/personal verification of valued scripts. The university communicates the result of such applicants within the stipulated time.

### 2.6. Student performance and Learning Outcomes

## 2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

Akkineni Nageswara Rao College has clearly stated learning outcomes. The college wishes to train its students to complete the course with the following student attributes:

- ➤ **Knowledge Acquisition:** The student completing a course should be able to master the depth of knowledge required for a degree, including the ability to communicate.
- ➤ Effective Communication: The student should be able to communicate effectively, including the ability to demonstrate effective oral communication skills and effective writing skills.
- ➤ Critical Thinking: The student should demonstrate critical thinking, including the ability to evaluate, analyze and integrate information from a variety of sources.
- ➤ **Global Perspectives:** The student should live and work effectively in a diverse and global society and articulate the value of diversity.
- ➤ Socially Responsible Action: The student should acknowledge the consequences of his/her actions; engage in local and global civic activities and develop a personal sense of social justice.

The above stated learning outcomes have been displayed in the college at important places like UG and PG libraries, College notice boards etc.

# 2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the students results / achievements (Programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

Monitoring the progress and performance of students is a continuous process and goes on throughout the duration of the course. It begins with teacher-student interaction in the classroom after a lecture and is continued through internal tests, unit tests, half-yearly/mid semester tests, annual / semester end examinations. The performance of the students is reviewed at the department / course level to make suitable changes in the teaching-learning process.

If a student is irregular the parent/guardian is contacted and counselling is given to the students in the presence of the parents by the in-charge of the department, Vice-Principal or Principal.

The performance and the progress of the students is communicated to the parents at regular intervals.

Parents are encouraged to meet the teachers after receiving the progress reports of their wards.

The Principal interacts with the students after obtaining feedback from teachers to encourage them to perform better.


After the declaration of public examination results the Management and the Principal convene meetings with the staff to review the performance of students in University examinations.



The results shown in the above table indicate the teachers have been trying to get the best performance from the students coming from rural area. In several courses there are 100% results and the overall pass percentage for nine years is 83% which is a highlight for a college in this region and comparable to any other urban college. In the academic year 2014-15, the College bagged 155 distinctions and 331 first classes. Four State Level Pratibha Puraskars were

awarded to our UG and PG students during 2013-14 and 2014-15 academic years. The College received award for being The Best Performing Professional PG College in Examination Results from the Acharya Nagarjuna University in 2008. The College has the practice of felicitating the toppers which would serve as an inspiration to their juniors. Thus the college has been successful in fulfilling its mission of providing quality education to the youth from agrarian background and in shaping them to be leaders in their chosen fields.

## 2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

To facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes the college uses:

- > Technology integration (use of ICT) with teaching to rouse their interest and strengthening their skills.
- ➤ Cooperative learning where the teacher serves as a facilitator and encourages the student to develop his learning on his own on the lines of the teacher's explanation and through peer interaction.
- ➤ Planning the instruction appropriately to help both the high achievers and slow learners who are given material to suit their aptitudes.
- ➤ Goal setting which helps the teachers and students plan clearly structured components of the curriculum to be completed within a specific time-frame
- Learning across the curriculum which encourages students of a discipline to follow other areas / subjects as per individual aptitude (that may even be in cultural activities, NSS, NCC and social service etc.)
- ➤ Formative and Summative assessments.

  These strategies are used by the faculty to bring out good performance of the students.

# 2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

The College has been a pioneer in introducing courses on need basis and relevance.

The College introduced courses like Computers and Electronics at UG level in the 1990s itself. With the demand for Management Courses at PG level MBA course was introduced. In addition to the aided M.Com. course started in the early 1970s several PG courses were started during the late 1990s onwards. These courses were continued as per student demand and had to be closed owing to fall in student enrollment. But when the demand revived some of the PG courses like M.Sc. Mathematics, Physics, Computer Science were revived. To equip the students with the knowledge from OERs (Open Educational Resources) free internet facility is provided in the Internet centre of the

College. The Language Laboratory, Commerce Laboratory and Computer Laboratories help the student learning and acquiring computer skills which are required for any kind of job.

The college Career Guidance and Placement Cell provides the required information regarding job opportunities and the preparation needed by the students to secure a job.

The cultural wing of the College, Akkineni Kalapeetam brings out the latent talents in fine arts and provides a platform to give expression to their creativity.

The College organizes industrial visits to instill entrepreneurship amongst students.

The NSS wing organizes programmes to make students participate at the grassroot level in society by sapling plantation, clean and green activity, Swachch Bharat, blood grouping and blood donation camps, aids-awareness rallies etc. to make the education they receive serve a social cause.

The NCC wing provides military training, promotes discipline, comradeship, selfless service and the spirit of adventure among students.

The College conducts seminars, guest lectures, and workshops on:

- Curriculum
- Acquiring training for getting placement
- Employability
- Health awareness
- Entrepreneurship.

Some of these are conducted as integral parts of the curriculum and some others are for developing the scope for student employability.

Soft skills development is also taken up in the college to ensure overall personality development of the students

Students are trained to face campus placements in the college or outside.

Arts and Social Science subjects have relevant topics on global trends (e.g. environment, human rights, work by NGOs, decentralization, population studies, gender studies etc.) and have relevant thrust towards communication skills, report writing and skills, computerization components, translation and so on.

The curriculum for science subjects contains theoretical components as well as practical components. The experiments in science practicals develop skills based on theoretical knowledge.

Further, problem solving exercises, field visits, surveys, industrial visits, project work etc. ensure skill development in relevant subject areas of study.

Thus the social and economic relevance of the courses offered by the college are ensured.

## 2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the College collects and analyzes data on student learning outcomes on the basis of their performance in class tests, monthly tests, assignments, seminars and regularity in attendance. The College uses this data to find advanced and slow learners:

- Material for value addition, individual study projects, latest advances in the concerned area are provided to encourage the advanced learners.
- For developing the slow learners additional coaching, remedial classes, learning through peer teaching are organized.

Thus the needs of both categories of students are taken care of.

### 2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The College has nominated class teachers for each section. They look after the progress of the students and monitor the achievement of learning outcomes. These are taken to the notice of the IQAC and the Principal. When a student is found to be lagging behind in a particular subject or when a class is not able to perform well in a particular subject, an in depth probe is taken up and the parents of the concerned students are also informed.

- ➤ Class tests are conducted on a regular basis to monitor the students' understanding of the curriculum and the concepts there in.
- Class level discussions are conducted to find out how a topic is understood in the class.
- ➤ Seminars are organized to find out if the students can express themselves clearly, persuasively and analytically and can answer the questions of their classmates.
- ➤ If some students are found to be lagging behind, remedial measures are taken, extra classes are conducted.
- ➤ Written assignments are given for making students write the answers to different questions which will serve as practice in the public examinations.
- > Feedback is obtained from students by IQAC and corrective measures on need basis are taken to ensure the achievement of learning outcomes.

# 2.6.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/ evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Yes.

The institution and individual teachers use assessment / evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning.

Student performance is assessed continuously by observing their oral answers after classroom lectures, marks scored in internal and public examinations, their clarity in writing answers to questions, behavioural aspects while presenting seminars, communication skills during interaction with teachers and peers, their initiative for taking part in college level and inter-collegiate level activities and performance in cultural activities, NCC, NSS, sports and social services and in diverse situations. Students with a desire to appear for competitive examinations are short listed and given additional coaching. Certificates, cash prizes and book prizes are given to students for good performance.

## Any other relevant information regarding Teaching, Learning and Evaluation which the college would like to include:

- ➤ The College has good faculty, necessary infrastructure and support services for the all-round development of the students.
- The admissions are transparent and where students face any financial disadvantage the Management or the staff members help them.
- > Special facilities and coaching classes are provided for advanced learners.
- > Remedial classes are conducted for slow learners.
- ➤ A total academic environment has been created on the campus where the students Enter to Learn and Leave to Serve and the college has clearly defined student learning outcomes.
- ➤ To make teaching/learning effective and enjoyable, a combination of traditional and modern methods are followed and ICT is used depending on the requirement of the subject and the ability of the learners.
- ➤ The well wishers of the College and the alumni have created several cash prizes for the students.
- Latest teaching-learning aids, appropriate reading material are acquired through the libraries.

- > Teachers are recruited on merit and following the norms laid down by the UGC, and University.
- > The evaluation procedures are objective and student-friendly.
- > Feedback on the performance of faculty is collected periodically.
- Faculty members are encouraged to take up research, paper presentations to prevent their stagnation and complacency.

The Research Committee of the College facilitates and monitors research activities. It plans to promote research and motivate the faculty for an academic advancement. The committee keeps track of the schemes of UGC. It updates the teachers about various fellowships and helps them to apply for the same. Some of the teachers have completed their M.Phil. and Ph.D. Some have undertaken Major and Minor Research Projects from UGC.

## A few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact:

- ➤ The committee provides necessary help to the interested faculty members to apply for research grants / research projects.
- The committee also recommends for providing infrastructural facilities like computers with internet and printer, reference textbooks, journals, magazines, and news papers to the research scholars.
- ➤ The committee recommends the names of faculty members to the Management for financial grant / study leave to complete their research work.
- ➤ The committee provides guidelines to the faculty for doing Ph.D. and M.Phil. and applying for other Faculty Development Programmes according to UGC norms.
- ➤ It encourages faculty to become Research Supervisors.
- ➤ It also encourages and appreciates Research publications.
- ➤ It also encourages the Guest Faculty and Temporary Faculty to appear for NET/SLET and UGC Research fellowship examinations.

## 3.1.3. What are the measures taken by institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes / projects?

- ➤ The Management has a positive attitude in encouraging the teachers to pursue research. The management has given travel grant to the teachers to present papers in various National and International Seminars.

The college has spent Rs. 20,000 for starting Research Centres under Acharya Nagarjuna and Krishna Universities thus showing its commitment for promotion of research. Moreover it has been encouraging the research guides in various departments to help promote research.

Though there is no provision in an affiliated college to provide seed money to the faculty for research, but the College Management has been encouraging the faculty to go for research activities by granting them leave facilities as per requirement. For staff working in the aided stream the college has been utilizing the facility of FDP of UGC to depute staff for research work. Thus Sri. A. Satyanarayana, Lecturer, Dept. of Mathematics, Smt. K. Janakee Devi, Lecturer, Dept. of Hindi and Sri. N. Krishna Mohan, In-charge, Dept. of Physics are the faculty members who have improved their qualification by going for research.

## 3.2.3 What are the financial provisions made available to support student research projects by students?

There is no financial provision under UGC schemes to support student research projects in affiliated colleges.

## 3.2.4 How does the various departments/units/staff of the institute interact in undertaking inter-disciplinary research? Cite examples of successful endeavors and challenges faced in organizing interdisciplinary research.

The staff members of various departments interact with one another in undertaking inter-disciplinary research. Thus the doctorate degree holders of the departments of science help their counterparts in the PG departments to pursue research. Similarly the staff of language and arts departments also have been working in union for their research pursuits. The members of the department of Business Administration and the Director of Self-Financed courses contributes research articles on a regular basis to national and international peer reviewed journals. In some cases the researchers face the need for pursuing their work in the University / University laboratories and this challenge has been faced by adjusting class / college work and going to the University / University Laboratories for carrying on their research experiments of long duration ranging from 3 to 5 days.

The college also organizes interdisciplinary seminars and workshops where teachers from our college or from other colleges present papers on various subjects. A research paper Dr. N. Krishna Mohan, In-charge, Dept. of Physics has been presented in an International Conference and the challenge of inadequate funding from the organizers has been overcome, thanks to the financial support extended by the College Management.

## 3.2.5 How does the institution ensure optimal use of various equipment and research facilities of the institution by its staff and students?

The institution ensures optimal use of equipment and research facilities by its staff and students. Thus the facilities in the degree and P.G. libraries are used

by faculty and students of both UG and PG wings. Similarly the necessary equipment for conducting practical examinations in different UG and PG laboratories are also used on need basis by students and staff from UG and PG wings.

- ➤ Free internet facility is provided to teachers in all the departments and free internet facility is provided in the internet centre of the college which is used by all the staff members and students. Faculty members engaged in Major / Minor Research Projects can also use the internet facility in the internet centre which is kept open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.
- ➤ Research journals both print and on-line are made available to staff to pursue their research/academic interests. Those pursuing research activities are also permitted to work during holidays with uninterrupted access to the internet / libraries.

- ➤ MBA students visit reputed Manufacturing and Service Organizations across the country to gain practical knowledge.
- Eminent resource persons from industry are invited to deliver extension lectures to the MBA students.

The institution wishes to pass on the benefits of the knowhow, skills/expertise and gifts of the faculty to the needy institutions including local schools, Colleges, Universities, Government Agencies, NGOs, neighbouring villages, institutions for disadvantaged sections of the society. Mostly the services are rendered without the expectation of any remuneration. Thus several staff members provide consultancy services, and the achievements of the faculty are highlighted through news items as well as annual department reports and the Principal's report read out on the College Day.

#### 3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR)

## 3.6.1 How does the institution promote institution - neighbourhood - community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?

The institution promotes institution-neighbourhood-community network and student engagement in different ways:

A neighbouring village, Zami-Dintakurru has been adopted by the NSS Unit of the college. The student volunteers of the NSS Unit visit the village to enlighten the villagers about education, hygiene, health awareness etc.

The Eco-Club of the College in association with the NCC wings and NSS Unit conducts Swachch Bharat Abhiyan and clean and green campaigns. Aids-Awareness rallies and community health awareness programmes are conducted by the Red Ribbon Club of the college.

Our NCC Cadets and NSS volunteers provide service during community activities like health camps in and around Gudivada town, and in local temples, where functions are to be organized in a peaceful manner.

The Women Development Centre provides food and supplements to the residents of old age homes in Gudivada.

## 3.6.2. What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements / activities which promote citizenship roles?

The motto of the college, displayed at the entrance, is "Enter to Learn" and "Leave to Serve". The students should ultimately be involved in the task of national service. So, several service units of the college, like the NCC units, NSS unit, Eco Club, WDC and the Red Ribbon Club involve the student community in service activities. NCC and NSS certificates are given weightage in jobs and in admission to higher classes. Enrolment of students in these units and their activities are closely monitored by the teachers in-charge of these units.

Thus our students have been involved in:

- literacy campaigns
- sapling plantation
- clean and green Swachch Bharat Abhiyan
- blood grouping and donation campaigns
- providing support to the members of the orphanages and old age homes
- conducting surveys
- aids awareness campaigns rallies

- leadership roles like maintaining law and order during festival seasons
- 'runs' for social causes.

Participants in these activities are given certificates, appreciation letters etc. by the college. Thus the students who volunteer for these activities have scope to develop contact with the community.

## 3.6.5 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, RRC and other National/ International agencies?

The institution promotes extension activities by extending help in the form of manpower, funds, refreshments and transport. An Orientation Programme for the freshers is conducted and the interests of students to join various extension activities, including participation in NCC, NSS and other wings of the college, are collected. Students are encouraged to join different wings as per their liking. The NSS Unit has a strength of 100 volunteers. Keeping in view the social needs and responsibilities, students from all disciplines are enrolled for NSS for performing various social activities in terms of blood donation camps, extension lectures, skill development programmes etc.

The two NCC wings of the college undertake a drive to enroll membership in their units after admission in the 1st year. As a result they have an enrollment of 50 women / 100 men cadets.

The faculty members in charge of various service units of the college under the guidance of the Principal plan their extension activities for each academic year.

The College has an Eco Club, Women Development Centre to promote students' involvement in extension activities. The achievements of the teachers and students are acclaimed and highlighted in the college annual

reports published in the College Magazine thus encouraging the students' participation.

## 3.6.6 Give details on social surveys, research or extension work (if any) undertaken by the College to ensure social justice and empower students from under-privileged and vulnerable sections of society?

The details of the extension and outreach programmes for the last 9 years are shown below:

Socio-Economic Surveys of several villages have been conducted by Dr. S. Sankar, Principal and former Reader-In-charge, Department of English. The NCC, NSS wings in association with the department of Economics, Politics and MBA conducted a survey of the Pedaparupudi Village which has been adopted by our old student Sri. Ch. Ramoji Rao, Proprietor of Eenaadu group.

An awareness meeting has been organized with our students to condemn the brutal killing of Anuhya, a software employee of Machilipatnam, in Bombay. Books were distributed to students studying in government schools. The NCC Cadets distributed clothing to the residents in orphanages and old-age homes. Our Principal also distributed food and blankets to the residents in three oldage homes in Gudivada.

## 3.6.7 Reflecting on objectives and expected outcomes of the extension activities organized by the institution, comment on how they complement students' academic learning experience and specify the values and skills inculcated.

- Apart from academic instruction, the students are encouraged to take part in extension activities as they inculcate the values of social-justice, social responsibilities and good citizenship.
- ➤ The training in soft skills imparted to students, help them to persuade the public to maintain personal hygiene, sanitation, literacy and health awareness etc.
- > The training in NCC makes the students disciplined and helps them to control the public on such occasions to which they are called.
- ➤ The NSS volunteers learn how to be patient, humble and service oriented when interacting with the public.
- ➤ The Eco-Club volunteers know the value of protecting the environment and the Red-Ribbon club members learn how to safe-guard their own health and the health of the community from such diseases as AIDS.

# 3.6.8 How does the institution ensure the involvement of the community in its reach out activities and contribute to the community development? Detail on the initiatives of the institution that encourage community participation in its activities?

The college conducts its extension activities independently and also in collaboration with local community of the surrounding villages, or the Gudivada Municipality, Hospitals, Government Agencies and, different NGO's on various issues. The college students hail from surrounding communities and they in turn involve the community in their reach out activities. Examples of these include:

- Blood Grouping and Blood Donation camps (Rotary, Lions, Red Cross)

- ➤ Demonstration, exhibition for the benefit of farmers and use of our Biology Museum for the benefit of students of schools in the town and surrounding villages.
- ➤ Support of patients in need of blood transfusion by giving blood donation to Red Cross.
- ➤ In-plant industrial training is provided in the months of May and June every year for MBA students.
- ➤ Audio-video modes.
- Active participation in rural areas to create awareness about government schemes and sanitation etc.
- Taking part in government sponsored runs for a common/social cause.

Our NCC officers received awards from the Krishna District Collector for their performance in training the NCC cadets and contributing to social development. Our NCC Cadet L. ## 3.7.6 Detail on the systemic efforts of the institution in planning, establishing and implementing the initiatives of the linkages/collaborations.

The College is making efforts for establishing more linkages and collaborations in future with international, national bodies, industries to boost research, consultancy and extension tasks.

#### Any other relevant information:

The Peer Team which visited the college during the first accreditation in 2006 made the following suggestions:

#### **Suggestion 1:**

Creation of an "in house" research culture by developing a research centre and encouraging all the PG staff in general and aspiring UG staff in particular to upgrade their academic strengths to suit research pursuits is desirable.

- ➤ In the post-NAAC period our research guides produced 5 Ph.D. degrees and 39 M.Phil. degrees which is a commendable increase for any affiliated college and in conformity with the recommendations with the NAAC Peer Team.
- ➤ The College applied for Research Centre for the MBA Department and admitting scholars under the guidance of Prof. V. Narasimha Rao, Director, Self-Financed Courses.
- ➤ In addition, there are 4 other Research Guides viz. Dr. S, Sankar, Principal, Dr. K. Somasundara Rao, I/c. Dept. of Telugu, Dr. N. Krishna Mohan, I/c. Dept. of Physics, Sri P.J.S. Kumar, I/c. Dept. of Computer Science, admitting Ph.D. and M.Phil. scholars from other universities.
- ➤ 9 Ph.D. and 11 M.Phil. degrees were awarded to our teaching staff and 2 M.Phil. degrees to our non-teaching staff members in the post accreditation period, while 6 teaching staff members and 1 non-teaching staff member are pursuing active research at present.
- ➤ 104 papers have been published by our faculty members in national/international journals, seminar / conference / workshop proceedings.

#### **Suggestion 2:**

There is need to focus attention on improving the academic development of its PG teaching faculty and draw the expertise of senior/qualified UG faculty in PG programme enhancement.

The Management has been taking measures to recruit lecturers with better qualifications and have also been using the services of qualified UG faculty (present or retired) to handle classes in PG Programmes. They have also been encouraging staff members in PG Programmes to pursue research.

#### CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

#### 4.1 Physical Facilities

## **4.1.1** What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

The Institution's policy is to create and enhance infrastructure on need basis to facilitate effective teaching and learning. The starting of new courses and the requirement of new facilities for carrying out teaching and learning warranted additional infrastructure and also called for suitably modifying and renovating the existing infrastructure. The College Management has been meeting these requirements in a suitable manner. B.Com (Computers) was introduced in 2012-13 and the necessary classrooms and computer laboratories are made available by the College Management.

#### 4.1.2 Detail the facilities available for

### a) Curricular and co-curricular activities:

For carrying out curricular activities the college has the following facilities:

Classrooms: There are:

- 64 class rooms
- 22 departmental rooms
- 03 seminar halls.
- 02 libraries
- 21 laboratories for Sciences and English Language

Each classroom can accommodate approximately about 60 students. There are bigger classrooms which can accommodate up to 90 students with a dimension ranging from 60.26 Sq.mts. to 90.4 Sq.mts. The class rooms are well ventilated, with lots of sunlight, ideal for teaching and learning.

4 Classrooms have audio / video / LCD facilities.

#### **UG Library:**

The College UG Library utilizes a space of 1,333 sq.mts. with two Reading Rooms for free access to men and women students and staff members. The girls reading room also contains a Reference Section.

The UG Library has rare books at the disposal of Researchers, Scholars, Undergraduate and Post-graduate students of various disciplines. The library staff and the library committee have been taking steps to make the library student/user friendly. The College library is centre for accessibility. It has been developing on modern lines with Accession Numbering System and Catalogue of all books and journals and user friendly DDC numbering system according to the 19th edition of Dewy Decimal Classification System. Local Area Network (LAN) connects the library to the departments. There are two computers installed for the visitors to access the books and journals available in the UG

library. There is a photocopier with printing facilities in the UG library. Facilities like information on competitive examinations, career planning, online search for e-journals are available in the UG library.

### **PG Library:**

The PG Library is used chiefly by Post-graduate students, researchers of various disciplines. The library is operated from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. It has facilities for online search of books, journals and also for downloading material from e-journals and the internet. Similarly the books available in the PG library can also be accessed through Local Area Network (LAN). The computers installed in the PG library can be used for downloading material from the web. There is a duplex photocopier with printing facilities in the PG library. There are several numbers of back volumes of various Journals. Information relating to syllabus, old question papers, material relating to competitive examinations, career planning are provided in the PG Library.

Almost all the departments have departmental libraries.

#### **Computer Laboratory:**

There are three Computer Laboratories catering to the students of MCA (60 computers), MBA (60 computers), and B.Sc. (45 computers) programmes. There are 40 computers in the Internet Centre. There are 20 computers placed in the department rooms to provide ICT facility to the faculty members and students.

#### **Server Room:**

The college has installed LAN with a High Configuration Server 20KVA four online UPS units. The server based local area network (LAN) provides fast flow of data across computers in departments for browsing and downloading study materials, research papers etc.

#### Laboratories:

There are 21 Laboratories as shown below:

Physics (UG) -4; Chemistry (UG) -2; English -1; Computers -3; Botany (UG) -1; Zoology (UG) -1, Micro Biology (PG) -1, Botany (PG) -1, Physics (PG)-3, Chemistry (PG)-4

These laboratories are spacious and are provided with latest equipment to carry out practical classes effectively.

### **Seminar Halls:**

The College has three (3) seminar halls with LCD Projectors and Computers for organizing seminars, lectures, academic activities and administrative meetings.

#### **Indoor Auditorium:**

The Yerneni Chalamaiah Indoor Auditorium is provided with LCD Projector in addition to the regular audio facilities. The auditorium can accommodate about 1500 persons with a well positioned stage for organizing academic as well as cultural activities, conducting seminars, farmers' meets, counselling for

admissions, conduct of examinations, election counting centre and such other meetings by government bodies, officials etc.

#### **Open Air Auditorium:**

There is an open air auditorium which can accommodate more than 2000 persons. It is used for larger meetings, cultural festivals, students meets etc.

#### (b) Extra-curricular activities:

These include sports, outdoor and indoor games, NSS, NCC, cultural activities, yoga training, health and hygiene awareness lectures.

#### Sports, outdoor and indoor games:

Akkineni Nageswara Rao College is well known for its sports activities. Students take part in Inter-collegiate, District, State, National and International level competitions for different events. The College has the following play facilities:

- 3. Volley Ball Courts
- 4. Kho-Kho Court
- 5. Ball Badminton Court.
- 6. Kabaddi Court

- ➤ In addition, the college has facilities like Running Track, Long Jump pit, High Jump pits, play fields for Short put, Discus throw, and Javelin throw.
- ➤ There are also facilities for indoor Games like Table Tennis, Caroms and Chess.

### **Gymnasium:**

The College has a Gymnasium with 12 stations and modern equipment like Treadmill, Elliptical Bike, Electronic Vibrator, Stepper, Twister, Motorized Treadmill, Jogger Exerciser, Weight lifting and Power lifting sets.

The Students' Co-Operative Stores, A.N.R. College Employee's Co-operative Credit Society, Akkineni Kalapeetam, NSS and NCC Units have individual rooms from where they carry out their activities.

#### **Health and Hygiene:**

There is a separate room for quarantine in the hostels and health check-ups are conducted periodically to the students. The college has first aid equipment in several places for emergencies and after giving first aid the patient is moved to the local hospitals on need basis.

#### Yoga:

The College has been conducting yoga classes for its students and staff and the Krishna University also took our example and started a course in Yoga after it was first introduced in Akkineni Nageswara Rao College.

4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? Give specific examples of the facilities developed/ augmented and the amount spent during the last four years (Enclose the Master Plan of the Institution/ campus and indicate the existing physical infrastructure and the future planned expansions if any).

The college has a campus of 23.43 acres and it has been catering to the growing needs of the students from time to time. In order to meet the demands/requirements of courses introduced several facilities have been developed/ augmented during the post accreditation period as shown below:

The infrastructure is also made available for other academic bodies like Acharya Nagarjuna University Distance Education Centre, Dr.B.R.Ambedkar Open University Centre for conducting classes and examinations.

Further the College infrastructure is also provided for use of the State and Central government administration (Revenue, Police, Social welfare, Education and such other departments), for recruitment drives, for training of personnel during Elections, for conducting seminars, workshops etc.

The administration ensures that the available infrastructure is optimally utilized.

## **4.1.4** How does the institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities?

The institution takes care of the needs of the students with physical disabilities. There are approach ways with a comfortable gradient leading to the corridor and there is a stair case for easy access for physically challenged staff and students.

## 4.1.5 Give details on the residential facility and various provisions available within them:

The college is situated only 4 kilometers from the town and the staff never asked for the provision of residential facility on the campus. There are Hostels for men and women students and the few faculty members who wanted accommodation on the campus have been allotted rooms in the respective hostels.

### 4.1.6 What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

**Health Centre:** First-Aid Kits are placed at strategic locations on the campus.

There is a separate quarantine room in the hostels with first aid equipment and in emergencies the individual in need of medical attention is rushed to the hospital in the town.

The college organizes health check-ups for students and staff. Blood grouping and blood donation camps are also conducted in the college periodically. Vitamin supplements are provided to students on need basis in such camps.

4.1.7 Give details of the Common Facilities available on the campus –spaces for special units like IQAC, Grievance Redressal unit, Women's Cell, Career Guidance and Counselling, Placement Unit, Health Centre, Canteen, recreational spaces for staff and students, safe drinking water facility, auditorium, etc.

#### **IOAC:**

The NAAC room set-up for the first assessment was later converted as IQAC room. It is on the ground floor, very near to the Principal's room and the college office. It has been functioning with dedication for quality sustenance and quality improvement in academic and administrative activities of the institution. Adequate technological support has been given to carry out its work. Its main objective is to plan and implement quality initiatives in the college. It organizes regular meetings and provides support to all activities in the institution ranging from conduct of workshops, awareness programmes, special lectures on Curricula, Teaching, Learning and Evaluation, Research oriented seminars. It helps staff in applying for research grants.

The IQAC supports Total Quality management in Teaching, Learning and evaluation, Research, Consultancy and Extension activities for all stakeholders. It collects, maintains and analyses documents and evidences directly or through the College office. It prepares the Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) and forwards to NAAC. It analyses the feedback received from all stakeholders and informs the concerned persons about its outcome for correction and necessary action. It also provides support required by all staff for their quality sustenance and quality improvement in teaching, research and administration.

#### **Grievance Redressal:**

The College has a "Discipline Committee" which looks into the complaints of the students and redresses their grievances. Whenever the students bring an issue or a complaint to be looked into by the Discipline Committee, the Principal convenes a meeting of the committee to look into the grievances. The committee sorts out their problems promptly and judiciously. The committee also looks into the problems of women students if any and every care is taken to redress the grievances of the stakeholders as and when required. As a result of this, the College is able to maintain a pleasant atmosphere.

#### **Women Development Centre (WDC):**

The College Women Development Centre has been addressing issues related to women staff and students. The WDC encourages students and staff to participate in all its activities. It conducts periodical meetings and invites such persons who motivate them to work for women empowerment. The WDC tries to make women students conscious of their social responsibilities, and takes initiatives for guidance and counselling of female students.

#### **Career Guidance and Placement Cell:**

The Career Guidance and Placement Cell has been providing guidance to students on career counselling, skills development, job seeking skills and personal counselling and support. It helps students to cope better with the pressures of increasingly competitive environment. The Cell operates from an independent room and also organizes special coaching classes for students.

#### **Coaching for Entry Level Examinations:**

Akkineni Nageswara Rao College has been giving special coaching to students of our college and students of other colleges in the district for Common Entrance Examinations leading to admission in different PG Courses. This course is run free of cost. The faculty members are drawn from our college and from outside also. The coaching has good response and students are benefitted by attending these coaching sessions. In fact such free coaching for entry into PG courses is offered only by our college in this area.

#### **Health Centre:**

The Health Unit has made great progress in monitoring the health of the students, teachers and non-teaching staff. The unit provides First Aid Treatment for students and staff. First Aid Kits are provided in different places for easy access i.e., in the hostels, gymnasium, college offices and Principal room. The unit organizes annual health camp for physical check up, which includes height weight and general check up and blood group test of all students.

#### **Canteen:**

There is a canteen situated on the ground floor which provides food, snacks to the students and staff. The College Management provided the canteen with all facilities and it has been catering to the varying needs of the visitors.

#### Safe drinking water facility:

The College has installed an R.O. plant for providing safe drinking water to the staff and students. A number of drinking water taps have been provided at different locations on the campus for the regular use of students and staff.

Over the years the libraries have evolved a system to ensure the purchase of current titles, important books and journals. All the departments are provided their own computers with internet facility.

The faculty can access computers and internet facility in their own departments or in the internet centre.

The libraries also permit the students and staff to use computer and Internet facility for accessing the bibliographic databases.

The college deploys and upgrades its IT infrastructure and associated facilities periodically to meet the needs of the students pursuing different courses. The college has installed LAN with a High Configuration Server. The Local Area Network (LAN) facility provides fast flow of data across the computers in departments facilitating the users to browse and download material with 10 Mbps internet speed.

## 4.3.5 How does the institution facilitate extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer-aided teaching/ learning materials by its staff and students?

The college has installed LAN with a Server of high configuration. All the departments are provided computers and internet connectivity, the faculty members prepare and use computer aided teaching – learning materials. The students are shown PPTs, reference material that helps them in their academic activities. Further the students are also encouraged to prepare PPTs, download study materials, prepare papers independently under the guidance of teachers for presentation in Inter-collegiate seminars, workshops etc.

The libraries have made total computerization of cataloguing of the books and holdings and have been using ICT for accessing digital databases.

Dr. K. Soma Sundara Rao, In-charge, Dept. of Telugu, procured a computer under his Major Research Project with the following configuration and it is being used in the Telugu Department:

Wipro-Core2Duo 1.8 mhz, 1 GB RAM, 160 GB Hard Disk, Multi media DVD Writer, 17 Inches Monitor.

The research scholars working under the four Research Guides of the college are also permitted to use the computers in their respective departments.

Power Point presentations are regularly prepared by the faculty members for presentation of their research papers in conferences/symposia/ workshops.

The library also extends computers and internet facility and bibliographic databases through networked computer system.

All the sections of office (Administration, Academic, Development, Finance etc.) have been provided with computer facilities. Computerization and Information Management System in the administrative process helps in quick access of various data like student records, results, accounts etc. The examination section is also computerized.

In all, the 234 computers in the college are used extensively by students and staff.

4.3.6 Elaborate giving suitable examples on how the learning activities and technologies deployed (access to on-line teaching-learning resources, independent learning, ICT enabled classrooms /learning spaces etc.) by the institution place the student at the centre of teaching-learning process and render the role of a facilitator for the teacher.

In the Higher education today, the Teacher has become a facilitator. Teaching has become student centered and the use of technology has assumed more importance.

Computer aided teaching has been introduced in several courses and English teaching is also done in the English Language Laboratory. Our faculty members have also been preparing PPTs for presentation to teach certain lessons.

Similarly in Commerce the Tally programme is taught in the computer laboratory.

Use of technology has helped in motivating the students to a higher degree.

Even for the Guest Lectures organized by different departments of the college computer-aided presentations have been encouraged.

There are 4 ICT enabled classrooms, 3 ICT enabled Seminar Halls which help in orienting the students and faculty members appropriately.

There are facilities for students to utilize the technology in the internet before and after the regular college hours commence or after the class work ends.

Thus the ICT resources help the faculty to guide and enable the students of the institution to learn independently.

### 4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

- ➤ There is a Building Committee for construction, expansion and maintenance of physical infrastructure (buildings, water supply, and power supply and supervision) and the Management takes sufficient care to supervise the creation / construction of new infrastructure. There are full time electricians to attend to minor faults, repairs on a regular basis.
- The college has its own generators as stand by in case of power failure.

- ➤ The maintenance of computers and scientific equipments is done by the distributors or vendors under 'Annual Maintenance Contract' (AMC).
- ➤ Maintenance of sanitation is done by people employed on regular / contract basis.
- ➤ The campus upkeep is done as per the norms of the Andhra Pradesh State Government and its agencies like the Fire Department, Commissionerate of Collegiate Education, UGC and AICTE.

### 4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/instruments?

Annual maintenance and repair of the equipment is done by the science departments minor repairs /maintenance is carried out by the concerned non-teaching staff members on the instruction of the faculty members.

### 4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

The following major steps are taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment:

- ➤ Voltage stabilizers are used.
- ➤ Proper care is taken at the sub-station in the college to control voltage fluctuations. Maintained earth pits regularly with coal and salt. Power capacitors installed to avoid power fluctuations.
- ➤ The laboratory staff regularly carry out appropriate maintenance measures to protect scientific instruments such as microscopes, balances etc. Care is taken to preserve chemicals in the required manner.
- ➤ The College campus has 5 over head tanks and 5 submersible pumps for uninterrupted supply of water.
- An R.O. plant provides safe drinking water throughout and it is under AMC.
- ➤ There is a solar power supply system to take care of a part of the power requirement of the college.
- ➤ The College has fire safety arrangements in place, which include fire extinguishers, fire buckets, terrace tanks, fire pumps, down comer and hose reel to douse the unexpected fire. The College also received No-Objection Certificate (NOC) from the Fire Department, which ensures that there are adequate fire safety arrangements put in place.

The Peer Team during the First Accreditation suggested that the Hostel Dining room should be nearer to the Hostels and the College Management has

constructed a central dining facility which is used by inmates of Men and Women Hostels and even by day scholars, faculty members and visitors.

- ➤ The College Museum is maintained and there are regular visitors from the surrounding schools and colleges.
- ➤ The College Play ground is used for conducting the sports and games of the affiliating university and also the games and sports of various government and non-governmental organizations.
- ➤ The affiliating university also conducts zonal level, state level training camps in our college.
- ➤ The College also provides facility to NRIs to hold meetings on our campus.
- ➤ The College has been maintaining a list of blood donors and also donating blood to the Red Cross and Government Hospitals.

- ➤ The College also has a student welfare fund given to needy students not covered in other categories for meeting the expenditure on books, tuition fees, medical help, etc.

#### **Students with physical disabilities**

- ➤ To cater to the needs of the students with physical disabilities, the classrooms are arranged on the ground floor on need basis.
- > To help the students to enter the classrooms, inclined paths are provided to enable these students who use tricycles.

#### **Overseas students**

The College doesn't have any overseas students.

### Students to participate in various Competitions / National and International

- > Special coaching and guidance is given to students who take part in academic / sports competitions at the state / national / international level.
- ➤ Coaching classes are taken for such students by the institution and where necessary with the help of other academic sports bodies.
- ➤ Competitive Books and Magazines are provided in the libraries.
- ➤ Internet facility is provided in the Computer Laboratories and all the departments for helping teachers to guide the students on necessary aspects.

#### Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.

- ➤ The College has First-aid facility.
- A doctor is on call for the students in the hostels.
- ➤ 24/7 medical arrangements are made available by the Management and staff for attending to the emergency health problems of students.
- ➤ Heath Camps, Blood Categorization camps are organized. These have not only helped the students but also the local populace who are in need of blood transfusion.
- ➤ 18 students attending the communication skills classes have been identified for check-up by ophthalmologists and taken to Pinnamaneni Siddhartha College of Medical Sciences, China Avutapalli. Ten students were prescribed

glasses and the total expenditure of nearly Rs.10,000/-was borne by two faculty members of the English department, Dr. S. Sankar and Smt. B. Subhashini.

#### Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams

- ➤ The Career Guidance and Placement Cell provides coaching for different Competitive Examinations.
- ➤ Guest Lectures are conducted for the benefit of students who wish to appear for different types of competitive examinations.
- Competitive books and magazines are provided for the students preparing for these examinations.

#### **Publication of student magazines:**

The College publishes a Magazine **Yuva Kalpana** every year. It is a platform for students to publish their creative potential and to sharpen their writing skills.

- The Institution encourages entrepreneurial skills among students in general and commerce students in particular. Students are encouraged to volunteer in the work of College Students' Co-operative Stores to acquire entrepreneurship development.

- ➤ These initiatives of the College have resulted in developing the students to face interviews, and to get placements.

  - Additional academic support, flexibility in examinations.
  - ➤ To encourage the participation of students in extra-curricular and cocurricular activities, the Physical Education department has been following a student friendly approach. It has been organizing not only Intra College sports competitions but also University, Zonal and State level sports competitions to motivate, and train the students as per their natural inclinations. Each year at least one coaching camp is organized in our campus for such University level competitions.

  - ➤ For this purpose, the institution avails the services of the in house faculty and also outside experts.

### 5.1.8 What type of counselling services are made available to the students? (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.)

#### **Academic counselling:**

Academic Counselling in the college begins with the Admissions Committee which verifies the records and interviews the students seeking admission. Students who are not sure of the choice of course are guided on the basis of the marks they obtained in the qualifying examination. There have been

instances where students who showed inclination for a regular degree programme opted for restructured graduation programme after academic counselling. Similarly students who wish to join restructured courses but are not proficient in computers or unable to follow the medium of instruction are guided to join the regular degree programmes of the college

Moreover, the college conducts one week long academic orientation / counselling to all the freshers even before the date of regular classes prescribed by the affiliating university.

#### **Personal counselling:**

Personal counselling is also given on need basis. The class lecturers, the laboratory lecturers, the NCC and NSS coordinators, the lecturers in Library Science and the lecturer in Physical Education have a record of giving personal counselling to the students. In addition, the Principal and the Vice-Principal also listen to the various problems of students and offer counselling and help.

#### **Career counselling:**

The Career Guidance and Placement Cell of the college conduct seminars, workshops for the benefit of students. Various entrepreneurs, professionals, successful alumni from different fields are invited for interaction with our students and for guiding them in their career choice.

The Career counselling begins right from the time of admissions into the Degree / PG programmes and followed till the time the students complete their study in the college. The counselling / guidance by teachers starts with choice of course/ programme, participation in seminars, workshops, campus recruitments, pursuit of PG / Research after graduation/ post graduation. Students are also advised to prepare for various competitive examinations.

#### **Psycho-social counselling:**

There is a Women Development Centre and an Anti-Ragging committee in the College. Students having any problems, either psychological or social in nature are guided by these cells or by the staff members and the Principal. There have been instances where the staff members have gone to the rescue of students facing such problems.

➤ The College overall pass percentage for PG is 94%.

- ➤ The College overall pass percentage for UG is 73%.

- ➤ The Akkineni Kalapeetam also conducts competitions in Singing, Debate, Essay Writing, Quiz etc. and sponsors the winners to Inter-Institutional Competitions.
- Cultural activities are a highlight of the College Annual Day Celebrations.
- Annual Sports Day and Kalapeetam Day are celebrated along with College Day or independently and it is a common practice to invite a famous sports person and a noted cultural representative as the Guests of Honor for the College Day.
- ➤ Outstanding Sports Persons are also felicitated by the college in special meetings and suitable press notifications are also released. Teachers encourage outstanding but needy players individually with voluntary monetary help.
- > Special leaves are granted to enable the students to participate in different competitions.

activities, FDP lectures, and also for delivering inaugural lectures when a new course is started or an old course is revived or whenever a function/celebration is organized in the college.

### The Peer Team which visited the college during the first accreditation in 2006 made the following suggestions:

- ➤ Right from 1950 the college has been offering courses at the UG level in Humanities, Commerce and Sciences.
- ➤ It started the Post graduate Department of Commerce in the year 1974, the fourth College to start M.Com. Course in an affiliated college in the Andhra University area, and the course has been running ever since as an aided P.G. course.

- ➤ Since its first accreditation in 2006, the college has updated its infrastructure with ICT enabled learning by adding LCDs, creating e-class rooms, latest configuration Computers, 3 Laptops, 2 Notebooks and Printer Scanner Copiers.
- ➤ The teaching is student centered, and the students learn through assignments, seminars, group discussions, practical work, field trips and such other participative learning methods.
- ➤ To train students to compete with their peers in the college and outside, the students are encouraged to participate in Collegiate, University, Regional, State, National level Seminars, Workshops, Debates, Quiz programmes, Paper / Poster Presentation Sessions, Literary activities, and various exhibitions.
- ➤ The college supplements to the teaching of the prescribed syllabus through Certificate Courses, Add-on Courses to develop the skills and the career opportunities of the students.

➤ In additions to the traditional courses like B.A., B.Com., B.Sc., applied courses in Sciences like Computers, Statistics have been introduced. The college is ready to introduce / revive any new course according to popular demand. Thus B.A. course was revived and three M.Sc. courses were also revived as shown below:

- ➤ To bring out the creativity of students, Akkineni Kalapeetam, the cultural wing of the college organizes competitions in debating, elocution, essay writing, quiz, music, dance and drama. Science exhibitions and surveys on contemporary issues are conducted. The college provides opportunities to develop leadership qualities through the two wings of NCC (for men and women), NSS, and the Red Ribbon Club.
- ➤ The College Magazine Yuva Kalpana brings out the literary and creative talents of the students.
- ➤ To give exposure to students, Guest Lectures are arranged on a regular basis by inviting eminent persons from different fields.
- ➤ The College conducts an Endowment lecture every year on "Ethics in Public Life" by inviting renowned persons.
- ➤ Value orientation has been a strong forte of the College and the College also celebrates various occasions like "Founders' Day", "Teachers' Day", and "National Education Day" every year.
- ➤ Even while the students are taught the prescribed curriculum, they are exposed to different activities that help them imbibe leadership qualities required for the contemporary situation by encouraging them to participate in Red Ribbon Club activities, environmental awareness programmes, assisting the students in schools in the villages, helping the poor and needy in old age homes, and helping the authorities and the police during meetings, elections, surveys and the like.

## 6.1.2 What is the role of Top Management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

For implementing its quality policy and plans the College has co-ordination with the Management, Principal, Coordinator of IQAC and the College Council. The IQAC has been taking the assistance of staff for designing and implementation of quality policy. The 20 administrative committees start with the Committee for Admissions and ends with the Eco-Club. On need basis the services of members of non-teaching staff are also used in these committees. The Management takes a major role in the development of infrastructure facilities, appointment of staff and maintenance of service records. The promotion of research and extension activities is supervised by eligible Research Guides of the College under the supervision of the Principal and Management. Maintenance of campus and inculcation of the spirit of National Integrity etc. are supervised by the NSS and NCC wings under the guidance of the Principal. Student members are co-opted in Games and Sports Committee, PG and UG Library Committees under the Chairmanship of the Principal. The Principal communicates the decision of the College Governing Body to the concerned persons regarding the responsibilities assigned. Difficulty, if any, faced by the Committees is resolved in the Governing Body meeting.

### 6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring?

### The policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission:

- ➤ In the beginning of the academic year the Principal informs the faculty regarding any new programmes and projects being introduced from that academic year.
- ➤ In consonance with the vision and mission of the college the faculty prepares plans for carrying out the work with the help of various committees.
- ➤ The procedures followed in decision making are transparent and involve the necessary departments and individuals.
- ➤ The IQAC also coordinates with various internal and external bodies and individuals to bring about methods for the better working of the college.

### Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan:

On the basis of the academic demands, the College plans its academic activities. The College prepares an academic plan and specific dates for conducting examinations in accordance with the Calendars of the University / Commissionerate of Collegiate Education. Similarly dates for sports and cultural programmes are planned ahead and are executed as per the schedule following the rules and regulations of the University. The College has been taking initiatives in implementing innovative programmes like the organization of University / Zonal / Regional / State level programmes.

### **Interaction with stakeholders:**

The College involves the stakeholders - students, parents, faculty members, management, alumni, local community, government bodies and non-governmental organisations in the activities of the institution. Their suggestions are taken in preparing plans subject to the rules in vogue. While the students and staff members are the active participants in the teaching learning process of the college, the parents are invited on need basis to the college to sort out any problems the students may be facing. The feedback from other stakeholders is taken and the suggestions or directions of the governmental and nongovernmental agencies are adhered to. Such involvement of stakeholders helps in the improvement of the institution, its coordination and monitoring.

- The College has good co-ordination between the administrative staff and teaching staff and together they have been running the following three societies successfully:
  - A.N.R. College Employees' Co-operative Credit Society
  - A.N.R. College Employees' Building Society
  - A.N.R. College Students' Co-operative Stores
- ➤ Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders.

Feedback, about the academic activities and the Teaching Learning Process, is obtained from the students and staff by the Principal and necessary modifications, strategies are adopted. Needs analysis is done for finalizing the time-table and allotment of practicals for different classes. The in-house examination schedules are prepared after due consultation with the in-charges of all departments. Remedial classes are also conducted on the basis of needs analysis in different departments. Even in procuring books each year the needs of different subjects is taken into consideration and budget allotment is done on the basis of the findings. There is a mechanism for monitoring the progress of the students and conveying it to the parents. The Teaching and Non-

teaching staff contact the parents / guardians of the students under the direction of the Principal. Research culture is promoted among the staff and even the students are encouraged to cultivate research temper. The stakeholders of the college are involved where necessary in carrying out the academic endeavors of the institution.

### Reinforcing the culture of excellence:

The College reinforces the culture of excellence among students and staff through workshops, awareness programmes, guest lectures, seminars, use of advanced learning resources / ICT. It supports individual members of the staff and students in their pursuit of quality endeavors. The libraries with ICT and library management software have been helping students' access online resources in an excellent manner.

### **Champion organizational change:**

"Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world." The College believes in this maxim and right from its inception the College has been making suitable changes in courses and in organization. The College Management Committee, Governing Body, Principal and Staff meet regularly to oversee the academic and administrative functioning of the institution.

Where modern teaching-learning aids, infrastructure or new application of ICT resources are required, the College invests time and money to provide them. Similarly it promotes the Research activities of staff and training the students in enhancing their employability skills. In tune with the present times computerization is done in various processes of the College. Our students and staff are encouraged in taking part in interactive-endeavors like seminars, workshops etc. organized in our college or in other academic institutions.

Linkage with individuals, industries and organizations is encouraged for Research, Consultancy and Extension activities. To promote social-responsibility and good citizenship, students and staff are encouraged to work for:

- community development
- creating health and hygiene awareness
- environment protection
- organizing blood donation
- gender sensitization
- Empowerment of women.

Thus the college champions periodical organizational changes in tune with the times since it believes that "progress is impossible without change, and those who cannot change their minds cannot change anything."

## 6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

A.N.R. College believes in participative principle of management. The College plans and policies are framed on need basis after consultation in the Staff Council, IQAC or in the Governing Body. There are different committees, right from Admissions Committee to Discipline Committee to monitor the work of the institution. Students and Staff work hand in hand at different levels in the execution of the policies and plans of the College. The Principal and the Management review the outcomes and necessary changes for improvement are taken where required.

## 6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The Principal conducts regular meetings with the staff and the opinions of all concerned are taken for arriving at a decision on administering the college. The faculty members are assigned different responsibilities. They are guided to complete a task assigned to them in the best possible manner. The Principal and the Management lead the staff by example. The in-charges also show academic direction to their juniors by taking up challenging work or being at the forefront in organizing examinations right from monthly to public examinations. The faculty members of various departments are authorized to hold seminars, debates and quiz competitions at the department, college or university level.

Meetings are held periodically to discuss the modalities of carrying out any change or new assignment, and the Management also encourages the faculty to continue their academic endeavors in paper presentation, research, applying for projects etc. All these initiatives create an environment conducive for the academic growth.

The science department In-charges are given freedom to make the laboratories up-to-date according to the need of the syllabus and the times.

The Librarian is authorized to allocate the budget to various departments on need basis for the purchase of books.

Similarly the in-charges are authorized to conduct field-studies and to train the students in practical knowledge.

### 6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

A.N.R. College believes in developing the qualities of leadership among the teachers and taught. Many of our staff members have been assigned leadership roles by the academic bodies. Our staff members have been resource persons and they have been empowering others to lead. Similarly the students excelling

in different subjects and fields are given all the support to enthuse their peers in the college or outside. Some of the outstanding students are given financial aid to develop themselves and to be role models for others.

The WDC aims to empower women and various activities are conducted every year. The College believes that by decentralization and sharing of work among the constituents of the college, responsibility and leadership can be nurtured. A leader is not necessarily one who occupies a post, but anyone who can discharge duties in the required field in the best possible way.

Thus the Administrative Committees in the college give individual teachers and students' scope for promoting co-operation, sharing of knowledge / innovations and empowerment of the faculty. Several committees constituted in the College nurture management and decision making process among the staff and students.

## 6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The College Management and the Principal delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the various departments. The departments are given freedom to purchase books, equipment from their budget allocation. The incharges of sciences monitor the working of their non-teaching staff members and go for purchase of consumables and equipment after discussion in their respective departments. The lecturers in Library Science also discuss with incharges of different departments when procuring books.

The in-charges and faculty of different departments are given freedom and autonomy and they can approach the Principal or the Management for guidance and assistance.

NCC, NSS, Eco-Club, Women Development Centre are free to go ahead with their programmes in consonance with the general academic calendar and the budgets allocated to them by respective agencies. The overall administration is decentralized and the Governing Body of the College and the Principal are there to guide the constituent bodies of the college in such a manner to help promote academic endeavours. Research, extension activities, development of infrastructure facilities, encouraging cultural activities, maintenance of healthy campus life are also decentralized in the College administration.

### 6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.


Yes.

The College promotes a culture of participative management.

The Governing Body of the College Committee derives its power from the

General Body of College Committee. The Governing Body looks after the Management of the college by appointing the Principal, faculty, non-teaching staff. Several committees are constituted by the Principal for general and academic administration and student representatives are also involved in some of these committees. The Principal and the Management welcome innovative ideas, and suggestions from different committee members and thus the decision making process involves all those constituent committees.

The Secretary and Correspondant, and the Treasurer of the College Governing Body are always available for consultation and the decision making process is smooth and effective.

## 6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

Yes.

The institution has a quality policy, comprising the vision, mission and student learning outcomes, which has been developed over the years of its existence. It is periodically reviewed on need basis by the College Governing Body and the successive Principals. All the development activities of the College are the result of the cooperative work of the Management, Administration, Staff present and past, Alumni and the students.


### 6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

Yes.

The College has been developing need based courses and expanding infrastructure from time to time as per the requirement. Thus various courses have been started from the 1990s and a lot of infrastructure has been added in the college. New buildings are added, additional facilities are created, courses and combinations have been introduced, new faculty have been inducted, faculty development programmes have been conducted, research activity has been encouraged and strengthened. The administration forms several committees for the growth of academics and infrastructure in the college. The College Council and the Members of the Managing Committee take into consideration several factors (like the need for new courses or for reviving discontinued courses) while preparing future plans. Thus the demand for Management Post Graduates has been considered and MBA course was started. Similarly several computer oriented courses were started taking into consideration the demand for PG students with computer knowledge. A sister College of Education was started for producing teacher educators at B.Ed, D.Ed. and M.Ed. level. Several PG courses were started over a period of time on need basis. Distance education courses were also made available to the students of this region.

## 6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

The internal organization structure of the college is shown below:



All these members work as a team and help for smooth functioning of the College. The aim is to provide quality education and the best service to the students. The various sub-committees, each with a convener, take up the specific responsibilities assigned to them.

Quality sustenance measures are taken up and the Principal and IQAC monitor the progress of the academic and administration work.

Wherever required, assistance is taken from external sources, whether individuals or agencies.

The human and infrastructural resources of the college are used to the optimum level. The Management and the staff work with dedication to achieve the goals they have set. Other stakeholders are also involved and sufficient freedom is given to plan and execute the developmental activities. Smooth and disciplined functioning of the College is given importance in all types of activities.



### 6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following

### **Teaching and Learning:**

- ➤ The College follows an academic calendar.
- > Department level and individual teaching plans are made by staff.
- > Teaching is made Learner-centric.
- Teaching-learning aids are used (PPTs, audio and visual aids).
- > ICT is used to make the teaching more interesting and effective.
- ➤ Project work, presentations, field work, surveys, experiments in practical classes, guest lectures by experts from other colleges are arranged.
- Academic calendar is circulated in advance to help the students and staff to have a clear planning of the annual / semester work.
- The science laboratories are well equipped and the English Language Laboratory helps the students to listen to different topics from the prescribed text book "A Course in Listening and Speaking Skills".
- > Similarly the commerce students are given instruction in Tally.
- ➤ LCD equipped seminar halls, computer laboratories, internet facilities supplement the classroom teaching.
- A solar power plant, stand by generator for power supply make the teaching learning process uninterrupted and effective.
- Research temper is encouraged among the faculty and the students.
- ➤ The books in the libraries are catalogued following DELNET and N-LIST software. There are catalogues for choosing books.
- ➤ Online and print Journals are made available in the libraries and some departments maintain departmental libraries too for the benefit of faculty and students.

### **Research and Development:**

- The College has been known for its research temper. There are 11 staff members with Ph.D. as the highest qualification, and 9 staff members with M.Phil. as the highest qualification. Dr. S. Sankar, Principal, Dr. K. Somasundara Rao, I/c. Department of Telugu, Dr. N. Krishna Mohan, I/c. Dept. of Physics, Dr. V. Narasimha Rao, Director, Self-financed courses, Sri P.J.S. Kumar, I/c. Department of Computer Science have been acting as research guides for various Universities.
- At present there are 22 scholars working under the supervision of our College Research Supervisors.
- The College Committee and the administration encourage research activities. Necessary library facilities and infrastructure are made available for the faculty members to carry out research work.
- The Institution also sends staff for research under FIP programmes. The following staff availed themselves of this facility and acquired research degrees.

### **Community engagement:**

- ➤ Community engagement is carried out through the NSS and NCC wings of the College. Our students and staff are involved in community development, social work, health awareness, sapling plantation, blood grouping, blood donation, and health check-up camps.
- ➤ The Eco-Club develops an environment friendly attitude among staff and students. Adult education and literacy drives are carried out by NSS volunteers.
- A list of Blood Donors is made available and our students have been donating blood in Blood Donation camps and to individuals in need. The WDC strives to create awareness on women empowerment against exploitation of women.

### **Human Resource Management:**

➤ The College Management maintains cordial relationship with the work force and the Principal takes measures for effective utilization of human resources.

There is a harmonious working relationship among the members of the staff. The staff members are encouraged to develop their skills, knowledge, and experience to further the organizational goals. Performance appraisal is also taken to stimulate and guide employee growth. Human Resource Development is carried out by FDP programmes and training to office staff in using computer technology.

- ➤ Staff recruitment is done by the Management to fill-up the vacant positions. The staff members thus recruited are given orientation to help them adjust to the job. Training is given to employees for enhancing their skills to perform their jobs effectively. Cash incentives are given to motivate the employees for their work efficiency. New faculty members are recruited and in some cases even retired staff whose services are indispensable have been retained.
- Faculty members are encouraged to go for professional development training / orientation / (HVPE) refresher courses. Several teachers have been sponsored for research, participation in seminars, conferences, workshops, etc. Some have obtained membership in local, state, national and international professional associations. Staff development programmes for skill upgradation and training of the staff is carried out.

### **Industry interaction:**

> Students are led to various industries to interact in all possible ways with the spirit of deriving mutual benefit.

# 6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The head of the institution conducts periodical meetings with the staff and also takes feedback from them about the academic activity. Similarly the opinions of the students are also obtained about the teaching learning process. The outcomes of these meetings are placed before the Management and other stakeholders. Parents are invited to come to the college and meet the administration to know how their children are faring in studies and extracurricular activities etc. Information about the teaching schedules, academic calendar, month wise, semester wise and annual plans are prepared in the college and how these are implemented is reviewed by the Head of the Institution. Based on the feedback, necessary modifications are made in the teaching assignments. The Head of the Institution also places the progress of work or the need for financial assistance to specific students for the consideration of Management in the meetings convened. Their suggestions are taken for improvement in the existing system.

### 6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

The Management is pro-active. The Management always encourages the staff to suggest ways and means for improving the institution in every possible way. The members of the Management encourage and support the staff in improving the teaching process. The Management involves the Principal and the staff in decision making process related to the curricular, extra-curricular or administrative development of the college. Administrative and academic decisions are taken for the improvement of the teaching learning process in the college after sufficient interaction of the Management and the staff members. Various committees are constituted each year and all the staff members are involved in them by rotation. The conveners of these committees are given freedom to suggest various ways and means for the development of the college. The Management also takes keen interest in the alumni association ANRCOSA and every year a member of the alumni is felicitated in the College Annual Day Function for inspiring the present students. The suggestions made by the stakeholders are taken into consideration by the Management and implemented wherever is feasible.

In academic activities like conducting study hours, analyzing results, conducting remedial classes, providing career guidance and counselling, taking decisions related to extra-curricular activities, streamlining the administration etc., the College Management, Principal and staff members work like a unit through various committees. They range from admission committee in the beginning of the academic year to the prize distribution committee at the end of the year. The members of each committee are given sufficient freedom to complete their work and suggestions on need basis are given in the meetings with the Management. These suggestions are taken while carrying out the work. All these measures improve the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes.

## 6.2.7 Enumerate the resolutions made by the Management Council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.

The following resolutions were made by the Management during last year:

They include meeting the marginal expenditure incurred for installation of R.O Plant, Solar Power System, installing a statue of Sri Akkineni Nageswara Rao, former Chairman of the College Committee, collecting and contributing donations to the victims of the Hudhud Cyclone, reviving PG courses in Physics and Maths, etc.

All these resolutions have been implemented.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

The affiliating University can recommend to the UGC to accord autonomy to the college. The Management is considering for seeking autonomous status after the introduction of CBCS.

6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

Yes.

The College has a Grievance Redressal Cell. It looks at the grievances regarding matters related to the services provided in the college. The members of this cell resolve the problems promptly and ensure that the academic atmosphere and the work culture are maintained harmoniously.

Yes.

The Institution has a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance. Based on the feedback R.O water plant was installed, timings of the gymnasium were changed; open access to Internet centre is made available from 8 am to 8 pm.

- **6.3** Faculty Empowerment Strategies
- 6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

The Institution makes all efforts for the development of the faculty. New faculty members are given training through training programmes organized by IQAC. Senior staff, outside experts are invited to train the staff on the learner-centered approach to be adopted. Similarly suggestions are given on academic planning, use of teaching aids and ICT resources for making the curriculum interesting. The institution encourages research and promotes research culture. Leave, OD facility, providing seed money are some of the ways in which research and paper presentation, publication activities are encouraged by the Institution. This

approach has been helping the faculty for improving their qualifications and teaching skills.

Staff members are deputed to attend Refresher Courses, Orientation programmes and short-term courses.

There are also activities taken up by the department of Physical Education for the promotion of sports activities among staff.

## 6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The faculty members are encouraged and given permission to participate in Refresher/Orientation courses and short term programmes/ courses like HVPE, Soft Skills, and Computer Training for their professional development. This helps in skill up-gradation of the staff and their professional development.

The faculty members are also encouraged to attend seminars, conferences, workshops, etc. All these activities go on in an atmosphere of co-operation and the knowledge gained is shared by all.

There is skill sharing across departments, for promoting co-operation, sharing of knowledge, innovations and empowerment of the faculty.

## 6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

There is performance appraisal every year as per CCE format. Performance appraisal is also taken from each teacher when they are considered for placement to higher scales under CAS. The Committee for placing the Teachers in the Higher Scales includes the Secretary and Correspondent, the Principal of the College, University Representative and Government Nominee, usually the RJDCE.

## 6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

On the basis of the feedback obtained from the Performance Appraisal, the staff members are directed to go for additional training / orientation etc. on need basis. The University and Government authorities are informed about the need for the training of individual or individuals, and necessary arrangements are made to utilize the services of the staff thus trained.

## 6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

If the salaries of the staff are not released on time by the government, the Management gives collateral guarantee to the Andhra Bank on the campus to provide loan facility to the needy staff. Further for those staff who wish to avail different loans from the Banks the Management countersigns a guarantee to get the loan.

For the staff working in the self-financed wing, the college follows the contributory Provident Fund Scheme in which the Management contributes its share equal to the share of the employee every month. There is Group Insurance Policy for all staff members. For NMR employees accidental insurance policy is taken. There have been instances where funds are provided to individual staff members in emergency. Staff members have also been supported financially when they go abroad for paper presentations. First Aid kits are available on Campus and Health Check Up is conducted periodically. Almost all the staff rooms have their own Rest Rooms and there is a separate Rest Room for women staff. Separate room provision is made in the Canteen for staff.

During the last four years, about 35% of the staff mostly from self-financed courses have availed themselves of these welfare schemes.

## 6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

While the staff in the aided wing have several options to avail themselves of the UGC / State Government Schemes, the staff members in the Self-financed wing are also given encouragement to improve their skills and qualifications.

Thus several staff members have improved their qualifications, acquired research degrees, participated in training programmes and are sent as examiners, members of boards of studies to the university or neighboring colleges. Sufficient freedom is given to the staff for pursuing their research / academic interests.

### **6.4** Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

### 6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The College is a grant-in-aid college and there are also UG and PG sections being run on self-financed basis. The Commissionerate of Collegiate Education, Government of Andhra Pradesh provides grant to meet the salary budget of aided staff. The Management deposits the fees collected from the aided sections' students into the government account.

The UGC also provides financial assistance to the College under various schemes since the College is covered under 2 (F) and 12 (B).

In the self-financed wing, the Management collects the fees from students as per the rates prescribed by the University and the Government. From this collection funds are allocated for payment of salaries and other recurring expenditure in the self-financed wing. The Principal and the Treasurer of the College Managing Committee closely monitor the Income/expenditure in the aided and self-financed wings respectively. The institution follows proper procedure for purchases.

Quotations are called for and prices are compared in the Science department where consumables are used and a comparative statement is prepared before placing an order.

## 6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The College has a mechanism for internal and external audit. The government auditors and the regular internal auditor of the College also check the expenditure. The internal audit is carried out under the direction of the College Governing Body. The external audit is carried out by a Government auditor deputed by the CCE and AG as per the provisions of the Government of Andhra Pradesh every year.

# 6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

The Government Social Welfare Department releases fees for the students belonging to various categories. They are the major sources of institutional receipts. And if they are not released on time they become the major sources of deficit.

In the grant-in-aid scheme the salary, arrears grants and various grants from the UGC schemes are other sources of receipts.

The deficit in the self-financed wing is managed by the Governing Body which takes decisions on individual case basis and merit basis.

For the deficits, if any, in the aided wing the college approaches the appropriate authorities of the government for release of necessary grants.

## 6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

The College has been able to get funds from the Government UGC, CCE, RUSA, the Social Welfare Departments, NCC and NSS Wings, Philanthropists and Alumni. In the post accreditation period two alumni of the college donated Rs. 1,00,000/- each. The funds so received have been spent on creating infrastructure, organizing seminars and workshops, granting scholarships etc. to students, organising extension activities, and instituting Merit-cum-Means scholarships.

### 6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

### **6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)**

(a) Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

Yes.

During the academic year 2005-06 the IQAC was established in the college. The college went for the first assessment in 2006 January and was accredited at the B<sup>++</sup> Level with an institutional score of 82.7%. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the College has developed several quality assurance mechanisms within the existing academic and administrative system. The Composition of the IQAC is as follows:

The IQAC of the college takes care of quality assurance as shown below:

- ➤ The IQAC with the support of the College Governing Body carries out Planning, Implementation, Monitoring and Evaluation work of the College.
- ➤ Post NAAC Accreditation work is carried on by the IQAC.
- ➤ The IQAC Coordinator is consulted in all work relating to the soliciting of UGC or other Grants.
- ➤ The IQAC monitors the functioning of various administrative and academic committees in the college.
- ➤ IQAC maintains coordination with the stakeholders of the college.
- ➤ IQAC follows the academic and administrative auditing suggested by the department of Higher Education, Government of Andhra Pradesh.
- > IQAC suggests need based changes based on the academic and administrative audit of the College.
- ➤ IQAC follows a Quarterly / Monthly calendar for its meetings. IQAC plans and implements quality sustenance initiatives and takes appropriate steps for their implementation.
- ➤ IQAC organises workshops, awareness programmes, special lectures on quality, innovations. It encourages staff members to apply for Research and Seminar grants; use of Advanced Learning Resources, ICT etc. It empowers staff and tries to kindle leadership qualities among them. It works for Total Quality Management, Curriculum Development, proper methods of Teaching, Learning and Evaluation, Research, Consultancy and Extension activities among the students and staff. In these initiatives it involves the stakeholders.
- ➤ IQAC collects, maintains and analyses documents and evidences directly or through the College Office for preparing the Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) for online submission to NAAC.
- ➤ IQAC analyses the feedback received from stakeholders and informs the concerned about its outcome for remedial measures / improvement.

## (b) How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management / authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

The IQAC has made several recommendations to the Management and almost all of them have been approved as the following list shows:

- ➤ In fact, the Physical Infrastructure Development with adequate furniture and separate rest rooms in most of the departments came into being during the first accreditation time, due to the suggestions made by the then IQAC members.
- ➤ Similarly renovation of the College Canteen and Common Rooms, Principal's office were also taken up during that time.
- ➤ The Construction of an Internet Centre and establishment of Language and Commerce Laboratories, Construction of a Guest Room were taken up and completed due to the recommendations of IQAC.
- ➤ The purchase of modern equipments for UG and PG Courses on need basis was taken up on the suggestion of IQAC.
- ➤ Computers were made available to all departments, Internet and LAN connections were provided.
- ➤ Total Office and Library Automation works were also carried out as per the recommendation of IQAC.
- ➤ e-journal procurement and e-books download practice are also initiatives of IQAC.
- ➤ The IQAC also works for the promotion of Research and Publications by faculty.
- > Similarly extension activities are also encouraged by IQAC.

## (c) Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

Yes.

The former Principal Dr. Y. Venkateswara Rao, Industrialist Sri M. Narayana Prasad, Community Representative P.V. Apparao are the external members. They have been addressing the students, making suggestions for strengthening student amenities etc.

### (d) How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IOAC?

The students are encouraged to bring their requirements to the notice of IQAC. Based on their suggestions improvements are made in teaching-learning process (use of LCDs, Computer Aids), examination system, facilities in libraries, in dining halls, or in canteen.

The top students in the College are taken into confidence while taking decisions relating to their welfare. The alumni of the College are involved in IQAC activities and there is at least one member from the Alumni in the IQAC.

### (e) How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

The IQAC consists of Teachers, Students, Non-Teaching Staff, Alumni and Management members who give their opinions and work together in planning the activities of the College. It represents almost all the stakeholders and the decisions arrived at are communicated to all the constituent members of the College by holding meetings or circulating notices or sending e-mails. While executing the plans of IQAC the staff members and the students are also involved. Thus the IQAC contributes to the effective functioning of the College

## 6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalisation.

Yes.

- ➤ In order to meet the need of the students different strategies are adopted by the institution. They include approaches to satisfy the needs of the students from diverse backgrounds including socio-economic backward community duly complying with the norms of the Government.
- ➤ Learner-centered approach is encouraged.
- Academic planning, use of modern teaching-learning aids and application of ICT help in teaching the students in an interesting and effective manner.
- > There is a mechanism for conducting examinations and monitoring the progress of the students.
- For the upkeep of infrastructure facilities, adequate measures are taken.
- ➤ To encourage and motivate the students to enhance their skills a Career Guidance and Placement Cell is in place. It also provides them information relating to the opportunities in higher education.
- ➤ The Women's Development Centre (WDC) works for the benefit of women students and encourages them to improve their core competencies and entrepreneurial approach.
- ➤ The College has been promoting research culture, research publications, and professional development of faculty members through individual encouragement and FDP programmes.
- ➤ The faculty and the students participate in community services and extension activities to develop the social responsibilities amongst its student community.
- ➤ Due to the continuous encouragement of Akkineni Kalapeetam and the Physical Education Department a large number of students have been coming forward for participation in various cultural and sports activities.
- ➤ Remedial-coaching classes for socio-economically backward students, Grievance Redressal Cell and Student-Aid-Fund help in supporting the needy students.

## 6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

The Institution has been encouraging its staff to participate in different training programmes for quality sustenance. Further the IQAC members participate in IQAC related workshops to get necessary insight. This has helped the faculty members in adopting improved teaching methods for enhancing the communication skills, employability opportunities, leadership qualities and social service orientation of the students.

## 6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

Yes.

The institution undertakes Academic Audit. It is normally conducted by the Commissionerate of Collegiate Education and the suggestions made in the audit are implemented.

This audit makes the students and teachers quality conscious and improves the quality of the institutional procedure.

The review of results help in identifying student toppers who are encouraged to go for higher studies.

The IQAC and the members of various committees of the College prepare strategies right from the admission of students to getting good results.

For the low achievers remedial classes are conducted.

Based on the suggestions made in academic audit new additions are made to the infrastructure.

Every year the departments keep adding books, journals, software or equipment on need basis for the benefit of the students.

## 6.5.5 How is the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

The College follows the rules of the affiliating University, the guidelines of UGC and the instructions of CCE and maintains standards in teaching-learning process, conduct of examination and evaluation.

It also utilizes the schemes offered by these agencies for conducting curricular and co-curricular programmes as per the calendar of the University.

## 6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

- ➤ There is an Academic Calendar for the College and a Teaching Plan for each department.
- ➤ These aim at completing the course content as per the time schedule of the University.
- ➤ The Students are informed through the academic calendar the time for monthly, mid-semester / year examinations.
- ➤ Normally the teachers prepare such a time frame for teaching the complete syllabus with a possible scope for revision.
- ➤ The in-charge of the department monitors the completion of syllabus and how it is carried on every month is reviewed by the Principal.
- ➤ Necessary corrections are made primarily by individual member or the in-charge of the department in the schedule prepared and they are taken up for discussion in departmental meetings.
- ➤ Various methods are used which include, learner-centered approach, use of interactive techniques, audio-visual mode of teaching, ICT based learning, organizing class room seminars, debates, guest lectures by experts from other Colleges and Universities, inter-departmental lecture exchange, and presentations.
- ➤ Where possible project-based learning, field work, surveys are also taken up.
- ➤ Information is made available to the students about the evaluation methods and the examination schedule.
- ➤ The Principal conducts meetings with the staff on a regular basis to take feedback on the progress of teaching-learning activities.
- ➤ Thus, the college makes use of systematic planning in the implementation of teaching-learning-evaluation within the scheme of University schedule for obtaining optimum results.

## 6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

The progress of the students is communicated to the students in the classes and to their parents through letters.

The Prospectus, the Handbook of information and Calendar and the website of the College <a href="https://www.anrcollege.edu">www.anrcollege.edu</a> gives detailed information about the College.

The policies to be adopted and plans for quality assurance are communicated to the faculty members.

New recruits are given training on these aspects normally during the beginning months of the academic year.

The need for quality assurance is communicated by IQAC Coordinator and the Principal in meetings of different sub-committees and the general staff meetings.

Students are also made aware of the quality policies of the College and the incharges of departments also take up that responsibility depending on the nature of their subject.

The alumni members are also involved in communicating the policies and plans regarding the quality assurance to the present batches of students.

The plans for quality assurance taken up by the College are communicated to the University, State Government and NAAC through Annual Academic Reports, Annual Quality Assurance Reports (AQAR) etc.

## Any other relevant information regarding Governance Leadership and Management which the college would like to include.

- ➤ The College is promoted chiefly by farmers of the region. Their culture of participative management is continued in the College.
- > Several committees are constituted for overall management of the admission, conducting examinations, sports and the like.
- ➤ Promotions of research and extension activities are given adequate importance.
- ➤ The development of infrastructure facilities on a regular basis, encouraging cultural activities, maintenance of healthy campus life are some features of the college.
- ➤ The college encourages decentralization in carrying out work and provides operational autonomy to the departments.
- ➤ Performance Appraisal of the staff helps the evaluation of teachers and the methods they follow.
- > Since a large number of staff members retired and no recruitment is permitted in the aided vacancies the existing members perform multiple activities for better functioning of the College.
- After the first assessment there was a delay in going for the second accreditation chiefly because of the decrease in strength and lack of demand for different courses but this hurdle is slowly being overcome.
- Several groups / courses are revived and the College Internal Quality Assurance Cell has taken up the challenge to see that quality assurance mechanisms are in place in the existing academic and administrative system.
- > Several members of the Management and Teachers occupy leadership positions in local society or teaching community to serve as role models for the stakeholders of the College.

### CRITERION VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

#### 7.1 Environment Consciousness

### 7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

The College is situated in an agrarian landscape. Most of the faculty and students are from the agrarian background. Several plants and trees are grown on the 23.43 acre campus. The members of the Management, the Staff Council, the NCC, the NSS unit, the Eco Club and the Students undertake various activities relating to Environment protection. The institution takes all possible steps to make the campus eco-friendly. The use of plastic bags is discouraged on the campus. The members of the Management, staff and students plant saplings during various tree plantation programmes organized by the institution and all of them are taken care of and maintained by the institution.

### 7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

- > Energy conservation
- > Use of renewable Energy
- ➤ Water harvesting
- ➤ Check dam construction
- > Efforts for Carbon Neutrality
- ➤ Plantation
- ➤ Hazardous waste management
- > e-Waste management

The initiatives taken by the college are shown below:

### **Energy conservation:**

The college classrooms have been constructed as per the guidelines of the UGC. They are spacious, well ventilated and lighted. The Institution has installed a 10 KV Solar Power Plant to see that the consumption of electricity supplied by the APSEB is reduced. Further care is taken to see that no electric equipment runs without need. To reduce electricity consumption CFL light bulbs are also used in the corridors of the College. Soon they will be replaced by LED bulbs.

### **Use of Renewable Energy:**

The 10 KV Solar Power which is renewable energy has made the College ecofriendly by saving on the total consumption of power supplied by thermal, gas electricity generating units of the Andhra Pradesh State Electricity Board. We also saved about 20% on the regular electricity bill.

### **Efforts for Carbon neutrality**

The College with its greenery has been contributing to lowering the levels of carbon dioxide in this region. The College has parking arrangements for the vehicles of students and staff closer to the entrance. Use of vehicles on the campus for moving from one block to another is not required. This helps in keeping the campus free from carbon emission. The campus is made a non-smoker zone as per the policy of the State and Central governments. The dead leaves are used to prepare compost. The waste papers are sold for recycling. Where ever possible the dead leaves are allowed to decompose by burying them in the soil in the pits dug for this purpose.

#### **Plantation**

The eco-club, along with NCC Cadets, NSS Volunteers, students participating in various games and members of Women Development Centre (WDC) organize tree-plantation on the campus and they also take such initiatives outside the campus. The College has a botanical garden and a garden for medicinal plants, which are maintained carefully by the college authorities.

### Hazardous waste Management and e-Waste management

The College authorities have taken measures to dispose metal or glass waste from the laboratories by selling them or giving away for recycling to see that it doesn't harm the environment. Further the e-waste from the computer department and the computer laboratories is sold for recycling. Waste chemical bottles if any, in the chemistry laboratories, are properly disposed as per the guidelines.

### Other activities undertaken by the Eco Club for creation of Environment awareness:

- ➤ The Eco Club with the help of the administration organizes Farmers' Meets, seminars and invited lectures on environmental issues to create awareness not only in the students but also in the local populace.
- ➤ The College also organizes Scientific Exhibition and Environmental and Health awareness camps with the help of the NSS and NCC units.
- Further Posters and Handouts relating to Environmental awareness and global warming are made available to students. The Biology Museum has a collection of exhibits of endangered species of the world, which brings awareness not only to the students of our college but also to the students of local schools and colleges who are frequent visitors to the Museum.
- ➤ The NCC and NSS units of the College also conduct socio-economic surveys with the aim of making people lead an environment protective and hygienic life-style.

- > Training is given by the department of Chemistry on Soil and Water testing.
- ➤ PPTs and Short Video films are also shown to the students to educate them about Global Warming, Environmental Pollution etc.
- ➤ The stakeholders of the College actively participate in the Swachch Bharat Abhiyan.
- ➤ Bio-Diversity methods and news of the State and Central governments are also collected and made available in the libraries.

### 7.2 Innovations

## 7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

### **Use of ICT in Teaching-learning:**

Almost all the departments in UG and PG wings have access to LCD projectors. All the departments are provided computers with internet connectivity for accessing information, downloading videos, PPTs., etc. from the web and our faculty members also help students who want to become computerate.

#### FDP:

The IQAC of the College organizes a Faculty Development Programme for the benefit of newly recruited staff. Some senior teachers also take part in this training programme. The resource persons are drawn not only from the college but also from outside. Further, the faculty members participating in this training programme also present papers on any topic of their choice and answer questions asked by other participants. The lectures presented in the FDP are published in book form. From the feedback of the participants it has been observed that the exercise has helped them a lot in handling their classes.

#### **Innovations in Infrastructure:**

Four special rooms have been set up with modern seating and e-classroom facilities.

### Website:

The College has its own website <u>www.anrcollege.edu</u> with the necessary information. The website is user friendly and accessed by staff and students.

### Feedback Mechanism:

The College collects feedback from the students about the teaching and allied issues at the end of the academic year. The feedback from the students is obtained teacher-wise and course-wise. The model questionnaire issued by the CCE, Government of AP is used as a model to prepare the feedback form for this purpose. The IQAC analyses the feedback and submits the report teacher-

wise to the Principal for necessary follow up. The Principal in his turn takes the staff members into confidence and encourages the concerned teachers for future improvement and modifications. This helps the teachers to understand their strengths and weaknesses.

#### **Teacher-Student Interaction:**

Each teacher is assigned at least 15 students as his wards to guide them for their improvement. There have been occasions where in the students approach the Principal/Vice-Principal and In-charges of the departments for taking guidance on personal / family / financial matters. All the lecturers keep the Principal posted with the merits or weaknesses of individual students for necessary action. The Principal and the staff members also lead the students to exhibitions, workshops, seminars, sport-meets, health check-ups etc. to promote a kindred spirit among the students.

### **Computerization of the Administrative Work:**

The college has computerized its records and the administrative staff has been provided with computers. The Department of Computers Science gives necessary training to the administrative staff and the technicalities pertaining to work is made easier by employing the necessary software for this purpose. The acquittance of staff, the attendance of students and the sanction of scholarships are fully computerized.

### **Computerization of Libraries:**

The libraries in the College have been fully computerized and they use the DCAP.

### **Audio System for Teaching:**

In combined classes and in classes having large number of students audio facilities have been provided.

### **Public Address System:**

The College has an audio address system which is used during sudden meetings, rallies, oath taking during National Voters' Day to make announcements to the students.

### **Academic Innovations:**

- The College has been trying to encourage its meritorious students to excel in university ranks. They are provided additional reading material / books to strengthen their knowledge. Similarly students who are academically weak are trained by engaging special and remedial classes.
- The College has also been using the grants for remedial classes provided by the UGC for the students of SC/ST/OBC/EBC categories.

- ➤ The English Department provides all the students texts for the English Language Laboratory. Several departments provide reading material at a nominal cost.
- An Endowment Lecture is organised on "Ethics in Public Life" every year by inviting a reputed person.
- The English Department has a linkage with Prof. Lakshmi Gudipati, of the Community College of Philadelphia. She is a regular visitor to the college and addresses the students of different programmes.
- Guest Lectures, Seminars etc. are organized by various Departments.
- Field work / surveys are undertaken by the Department of History & Economics.
- ➤ Health awareness, Benefits of Yoga, Blood Grouping for Blood Donation are conducted under the auspices of WDC, NCC and NSS wings of the College.
- Earn while you learn scheme has been in existence in the college libraries.
- ➤ Best Utilization of Library Services award (BULS) is given away each year to the selected teachers and staff.
- ➤ The procedure of admissions is totally transparent.
- The Laboratories are upgraded periodically.
- Research is encouraged and several staff members of the college are acting as research guides.
- Most of the staff members are pursuing their M.Phil. / Ph.D. degrees.
- ➤ Career Counselling Programmes are organised in the college.
- Coaching Classes are given each year to the students of our college and also to the students of nearby colleges for Common Entrance Tests.
- For the benefit of students and staff desirous of appearing for the competitive examinations necessary books are made available in the college libraries.
- A large number of Merit-Cum-Means scholarships are provided mainly for students who are not getting scholarships from the Government.
- Gender sensitization programmes are organised by the Women Development Centre (WDC)

### 7.3 Best Practices

7.3.1 Elaborate on any two best practices as per the annexed format which have contributed to the achievement of the Institutional Objectives and/or contributed to the Quality improvement of the core activities of the college.

#### **BEST PRACTICE – I**

### Title of the practice

Promotion of ethical values among the student community by organizing an endowment lecture on "Ethics in Public Life".

### The context that required the initiation of the practice:

Sri Uppalapati Veerabhadra Rao who has been associated with this college from its inception, as the Founder Treasurer and held different posts till he breathed his last as the President of the College, created an endowment with a desire to use the interest accrued thereon to conduct this endowment lecture. Sri Veerabhadra Rao believed that "holders of public office should act solely in terms of the public interest. Several generations of students have come out of Akkineni Nageswara Rao College and several batches will be leaving the portals of this college to join public service. They must act and take decisions impartially, fairly and on merit, using the best evidence and without discrimination or bias."

### **Objectives of the practice:**

The students of an institution would go into public service or will work as public office-holders. Public service includes people who are elected / appointed to public office, nationally or locally. They should have the qualities of selflessness, integrity, objectivity, accountability, openness, honesty, leadership etc. It is the responsibility of an educational institution to install these traits into the minds of the students. The endowment lecture is in consonance with the motto of the college "Enter to Learn and Leave to Serve".

### The Practice

The College has been organizing this endowment lecture regularly. So far seven noted personalities in public life like Dr. N. Jayaprakash Narayan, IAS, Founder, Loksatta Party, Prof. V. Haragopal of Central University, Hyderabad and a noted Human Rights Activist Prof. N. Jayarami Reddy, Director General of Police, Guntur, Smt. Gottipati Satyavani, Convener of Bharatyeem, Dr. Tripuraneni Hanuman Choudary, IT Adviser, Government of Andhra Pradesh, Sri V. V. Lakshmi Narayana, Joint Director, Central Bureau of Investigation and Sri Kosaraju Veeraiah Choudary, Chairman, Central Board of Direct Taxes, created an awareness and understanding of the intricacies involved in

public life and how the students should imbibe them. By these endowment lectures the college tries to infuse the message of such leaders in public life. They create an awareness of the students' future, ethical responsibilities and how they should act as ethical leaders. Such interactions with reputed people in public life will help students lay a foundation upon which they will be able to build an ideal for themselves which can be followed as a future public servant. Such insights will help them how to think and act strategically when balancing professional obligations with personal morality.

### Obstacles faced if any and strategies adopted to overcome them:

In these days of getting things done somehow or the other it is difficult to convince students to follow the ethical values of life. Sometimes there have been questions from the student community about rampant corruption in society and the speakers have tried to answer them about the initiatives they have taken. They also advised that values in life should begin from the individual and spread to society.

### Impact of the practice

These lectures have helped the students understand the steps to be taken when they move to responsible positions in public life. The lectures have made it possible for our students to interact with iconic figures in society who have earned a reputation for themselves as ethical leaders in public life.

### Resources required

The Chief Resources are human resource in the shape of distinguished personalities. The incidental expenditure like travel allowances are met from the interest accrued on the endowment deposit.

### **BEST PRACTICE – II**

#### **Title of the Practice:**

Providing Financial Assistance to deserving students for books, examination fees, and health services.

### **Context**

Akkineni Nageswara Rao College is situated in a rural area. Most of the students who are admitted into various programmes of the College pursue their education through the Social Welfare Scholarships of the Government of Andhra Pradesh. Some of the students are not even able to spare money for their books; some can't pay their college fee or examination fees in time. Some students in need of health check-up can't afford to go to hospitals or in specific cases there have been students who couldn't go to an ophthalmologist.

In such cases some of the faculty members identified the problem, took the students to the proper medical facility to get their vision tested and also paid money for their spectacles and the money for transport from their home to the hospital. Some of these students who were thus assisted have been able to complete their Degree courses and get admission to PG programmes.

### **Objective**

The Management Members and Several Faculty Members have been contributing money to the deserving poor students to enable them to continue their studies. Some of these students have been able to complete their Degree / PG courses and a few have also been placed in different jobs. Some students in need of medical support have been provided money to meet their health needs. Similarly students have been provided books or money for purchasing books to assist them in their studies.

#### **Practice**

The Members of the College Management have been generous in assisting the students who can't meet their educational or health expenditure. They have been setting an example by contributing to need students. The Staff members too have been contributing money. There have been specific instances where teachers have paid the tuition fees, examination fees, and expenses relating to higher educational pursuits / competitive examinations. Students attending the Communication Skills Classes have been taken to Pinnamaneni Siddhartha Medical College, China Avutapalli for getting their vision tested and 11 needy students who have been identified for using glasses have been provided the recommended spectacles by the financial assistance our Staff members.

### Obstacles faced if any:

Students' not approaching the Management members or the Staff in time to get assistance to meet their need is the chief obstacle. If student's turn up in the last minute seeking financial assistance it would be difficult to find suitable donors or remedial measures at a very short notice.

#### **Impact of the Practice:**

These measures have helped in giving relief to some students from the economically weaker sections of society.

#### **Resources Required:**

People willing to contribute, and more importantly, people able to identify such needy students.

# **Post-Accreditation Initiatives**

The Peer Team which visited the college during the first accreditation in 2006 made the following suggestions:

#### Suggestion 1:

Creation of an "in house" research culture by developing a research centre and encouraging all the PG staff in general and aspiring UG staff in particular to upgrade their academic strengths to suit research pursuits is desirable.

- ➤ In the post-NAAC period our research guides produced 5 Ph.D. degrees and 39 M.Phil. degrees which is a commendable increase for any affiliated college and in conformity with the recommendations with the NAAC Peer Team.
- ➤ The College applied for Research Centre for the MBA Department and admitting scholars under the guidance of Prof. V. Narasimha Rao, Director, Self-Financed Courses.
- ➤ In addition, there are 4 other Research Guides viz. Dr. S, Sankar, Principal, Dr. K. Somasundara Rao, I/c. Dept. of Telugu, Dr. N. Krishna Mohan, I/c. Dept. of Physics, Sri P.J.S. Kumar, I/c. Dept. of Computer Science, admitting Ph.D. and M.Phil. scholars from other universities.
- ➤ 9 Ph.D. and 11 M.Phil. degrees were awarded to our teaching staff and 2 M.Phil. degrees to our non-teaching staff members in the post accreditation period, while 6 teaching staff members and 1 non-teaching staff member are pursuing active research at present.
- ➤ 104 papers have been published by our faculty members in national/international journals, seminar / conference / workshop proceedings.

# Suggestion 2:

There is need to focus attention on improving the academic development of its PG teaching faculty and draw the expertise of senior/qualified UG faculty in PG programme enhancement.

The Management has been taking measures to recruit lecturers with better qualifications and have also been using the services of qualified UG faculty (present or retired) to handle classes in PG Programmes. They have also been encouraging staff members in PG Programmes to pursue research.



The Akkineni Nageswara Rao College Students' Co-Operative Stores Ltd.(No.Y 166) was registered as a Co-Operative Society in 1964. The objects of the society are:

- (a) The encouragement of thrift and self help.
- (b) The purchase of books, stationary and other articles required by members.
- (c) The carrying on of business for the common benefit of the members of the society

All the students and members of the staff are shareholders of the stores. Students pay a nominal fee of Rs.3/-. The staff members need to pay a membership fee which changed from the original Rs.10/- to the present membership fee of Rs.400/- as per the Co-Operative Societies Act. Those who pay this membership fee become 'A' Class Members in the General Body.

The stores elect the following Board of Directors from the members as per the schedule given by the Registrar of Co-Operative Societies.

- a) President b) Vice-President c) Secretary
- d) Three Members elected by 'A' Class Members from among themselves.

The tenure of the members of the board of directors is five years. The liability of the stores is limited to the Board of Directors.

The Stores is maintained by the board members without any remuneration or honorarium and they look after all the administrative matters. The Board of Directors meet at regular intervals to review the functioning of the stores. Every year Financial Audit is done by the Co-Operative auditors which fall under 'B' Class. The chief items sold by the stores are:

Practical record booksStudent consumables & sweetmeats.

Computer sheets

> Writing material scales, pens, pencils

➤ Manuals ➤ Tooth Brushes, Paste.

Dissection implementsBiscuits.

> Text books > Special Texts and CDs.

All these items are sold at the lowest possible rate and the Board of Directors take every measure to pass on the benefit to the student members. The interaction with the students is on a very friendly manner and creates a very healthy co-operative environment.



#### PREVIOUS NAAC PEER TEAM REPORT

#### **PART I: Introduction:**

As early as in 1950, a strong need was felt for establishing a seat of higher learning at Gudivada – a district which had always been a seat of political and cultural activities and a college in the name of "The Gudivada College" was started. The founder visionaries laid a firm academic foundation for the College to grow thereafter. This college was upgraded as a First Grade college in 1952 and gradual progress was made by adding newer and need-based courses since then. In 1959, the college was renamed as "Akkineni Nageswara Rao College" after the nationally-and internationallyreputed cine celebrity and education visionary. The institution was started with a motto "Tejobhavatu" - meaning 'Let there be light' - with specific goals of imparting quality higher education to the rural population at the Krishna and its neighbouring districts. The College secured the UGC 2F and 12B status during 2000 and at present, it is an affiliated College under the jurisdiction of the Acharya Nagarjuna University and offers courses both under the Grant-in-aid and self-financing categories.

The Management of the College also runs several other educational institutions spanning from a school to a College of Education.

The College is situated in a campus area of 23.43 acres in a rural At present the college offers 7 UG, 8 PG, 8 certificate and 1 ambience. M.Phil. pogrammes. In addition, it also offers 20 add-on programmes. College has 7 departments under the faculty of Science, 7 under the faculty of Arts and 1 under the Commerce faculty. Additionally there are student support facilities for Physical Education, NCC and NSS activities, Hostels for both women and men students and separate/resource-adequate library facilities for UG and PG students. The institution has been running 3 UG under the conventional scheme with Telugu as the medium of instruction and 7 PG courses under English-medium and self-financing scheme. While the admissions for UG courses are based on the performance of the candidates in the previous examinations, those of the PG Courses is through the common entrance through ANUCET and ICET. 10-15% of the PG seats are filled under the Management quota. The management is also given the freedom to admit a few NRI students under the management quota. The temporal plan of education is annual for UG courses and Semester for PG courses. The unit cost of education, including the salary component is Rs. 19,015/- for aided UG

courses, Rs. 20,825/- for aided M. Com. Course. The fee structure varies for the other unaided courses and the management has been given the freedom to admit 15% of seats at its discretion. During 2003-2005, the UG results of the college ranged from 53-61 percent for unaided courses, 64-76 for aided courses. The corresponding results for PG ranged from 72-84 and 95-96.

At present there are 46 permanent staff (06 women and 40 men), 57 temporary staff (18 women and 39 men) and 14 part-time staff (11 women and 3 men) The total number of non-teaching staff is 90, which includes administrative, technical and supporting staff. Out of them 15 are women and 75 are men.

In the last two batches out of a total of 1877 students admitted, 975 were for UG and 618 for PG, and 4 for M.Phil., and 280 for diploma courses. Out of these, 349 were for self-financing courses. The average pass percentage at UG is 69 and that for PG is 83. The college has offered stipulated working days and during 2004-2005, the institution has bagged two university ranks for M.Com.

The college volunteered to be assessed and accredited by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council, Bangalore and submitted it's Self Study Report during December 2005. The NAAC constituted a Peer Team under the Chairmanship of Prof. Shakuntala Katre (Director, Planning, monitoring and Evaluation Board, Bangalore University, Bangalore) and Dr. Mercy Henry (Principal, Sarah Tucker College, Tirunelveli as membercoordinator) and Dr. K. Sasi Kumar (Former Principal, Sree Narayana College, Kollam, Kerala) as member. The Team visited the Akkineni Nageswara Rao College on 27<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup> January 2006. Based on the information provided in the SSR, additional information gathered during the team's visit to the institution through extensive interactions with all the components of the college, the peer team has prepared this report for the Assessment and Accreditation of the institution.

#### **PART II: Criterion-wise analysis:**

#### Criterion – I Curricular Aspects

Founded in 1950 as the Gudivada College, and rechristened as Akkineni Nageswara Rao College in 1959, the institution caters mainly to the educational needs of the rural population of Krishna District and suburbs. From its inception, the institution has been instrumental in providing the much required Higher Education opportunities to the learners of the region in Arts, Science, Commerce, Information Technology and Management studies. The College offers a good variety of courses at the UG and PG levels with much diversity and flexibility. The Management of the College has been sensitive to

the changing scenario of Higher Education from time to time and has taken up the challenge to introduce job-oriented courses and re-structured courses. The add-on programs also help to empower the students to face the challenges of the job market.

The College, affiliated to the Acharya Nagarjuna University, offers a wide range of courses in Science, Commerce, Humanities as well as courses approved by the All India Coucil for Technical Education. The undergraduate Programmes include B.Sc. (Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry-Telugu Medium), B.Sc. (Mathematics, Physics, and Computer Science-English Medium), B.Sc. (Maths, Statistics and Computer Science – English medium), B.A(History, Politics and Economics), B.Com and PG courses in Commerce, Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Botany and Micro Biology and MBA and MCA. The Certificate courses offered are Motor Vehicle Driving, Spoken English, Mechanism of Home appliances, Fabric painting, Mushroom culture etc. The Add-on programs are of 20/30 days duration and such courses in 20 areas such as Tourism, Stock and Stock exchange, Photography, Numerical Skills, Computer Programming, Soil Analysis, Language Skills, Entrepreneur Skills and others are useful value additions. For the academic year 2005 – 2006 the total enrolment of students is 1997 with 975 in the UG programme, 618 in PG, 4 in M.Phil and 400 in Certificate / Add-on programme. The UG programmes which began in 1950s and 1960s and M.Com programme started in 1974-1975 are in the aided stream. All the other courses are run on selffinancing pattern. The students get the opportunity for horizontal mobility to a certain extent, by pursuing the add-on programs offered by the College. Students at the UG level have the option for elective subjects and have opportunity for vertical mobility. Generally the Curriculum is revised and updated by the University once in five years.

The College has contributed in the revision of curriculum of various branches and courses of study by virtue of many teachers functioning as members/chairmen of Boards of studies of the University. The Institution takes into account the feed backs obtained from the students for further improvement of academic activities. The College encourages conduct of seminars, participation of teachers in national and international conferences, and such other intellectual and co curricular activities. The Akkineni Kalapeetam functions as a forum for imparting training to the students in cultural events.

#### Criterion - II Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

Admission to various courses of study is as per the rules and regulations of the state Government, the affiliating University and All India Council for Technical Education. For admission to UG courses the merit list

prepared by College is followed taking in to account the rules regarding reservation to the socially backward students which comes to 47%. The details of courses of study and mode of admission are published in the admission prospectus issued by the College as well as at the portico of the college. The admission to PG courses is based on the list prepared by the University through a common Entrance Test. With regard to MBA and MCA the admission is carried out online on the basis of integrated Common Entrance Test conducted at the state level.

There is provision in the College for assessing the students' knowledge after admission through monthly tests and assignments. With the assistance of UGC, the College conducts Remedial Classes for the benefit of slow learners. The students of PG and Professional Courses like MBA and MCA get the of Personality development Programmes and training Communication and presentation skills. Advanced learners are also identified and encouraged by awarding them prizes. Exceptionally good students are provided with other facilities like opportunity for participation in seminars, presentations, Group Discussions etc. The students of the general PG, MBA and MCA are encouraged to develop projects, participate in National level and other Personality Competitions, Placement Tests development programmes.

The College prepares an academic plan for the ensuing year during the last week of the previous year. This program is implemented with modification, if necessary. The Heads of the Departments monitor the teaching diaries, teaching Plans, and compliance of teaching schedule by the teachers. Regular departmental meetings are conducted to review the functioning of the Department. The Principal checks the teaching diaries regularly. The lecture method of teaching is supplemented by seminars, group discussions, assignments, use of charts, models, OHP, LCD and case method of instruction for MBA course. Project works, industrial visits etc are part of the curriculum of MCA and MBA courses. Most of the departments have published monographs on topics of importance.

The College has a centralized media facility for preparation of audio visual and other teaching aids. The departments of Zoology and Botany maintain their own departmental museums. A medicinal plant garden is maintained by the department of Botany. The tissue culture lab has started functioning. A prototype of vermi compost production unit is erected in the department of Zoology. The College has prepared a CD of Question banks in 16 subjects for the first year degree programme. There were 210 and 212 working days during the last two years. 90% of classes are engaged by full-time faculty.

The College follows a transparent pattern of internal assessment of students. The Semester system is followed for the PG students and marks intimated to them. Separate academic Calendars are published for the Aided and Self financing courses. The Calendar gives exhaustive details with regard to the academic activities of the college like examination date, rules regarding discipline, due date for payment of fee etc.

Recruitment of Staff is as per the UGC norms and rules and regulations of the University and the State government. A Committee comprising of the correspondent of the college, Government nominee, University nominee, subject experts and the Principal constitute the selection Committee. In the case of Non-teaching staff, the correspondent, government nominee and the Principal constitute the selection Committee. In exigency, the Management is competent to appoint Guest faculty. The appointment of staff for the self financing courses is done by the Management and their salary paid by them from their resources. The College takes interest in furthering and updating the skills of teaching faculty. 49 teachers have attended National Level Seminars while 13 have attended at the International Level. 9 teachers have functioned as Resource Persons at the National Level. The Self appraisal format devised by the UGC is used by the College for the self assessment of the staff. In addition the students' response format is collected by the Principal for evaluation of the Faculty. The College conducts Seminars and Symposia on current academic topics of relevance. During 2003-2004, 2004-2005, 2005-2006, 4 teachers have attended orientation programs, 14 teachers attended refresher courses, 10 took M.Phil. degree, 1 teacher took Ph.D. and 2 teachers have availed the F.I.P. Scheme. Dr. S. Sankar of the department of English was awarded the Best Teacher Award by the government of Andhra Pradesh in 2005 while the former Principal Dr. Y. Venkateswara Rao was awarded the Best Teacher Award in 1991. Five members of teaching staff have served as Chairmen / Members of Board of Studies of the Nagarjuna University. Various departments have links with other organizations and the department of MBA has MOU with various industrial establishments. A good number of invited lectures were organized in almost all departments. The copies of CD containing question papers prepared by the teachers of the College in a UGC workshop held in the institution were distributed to other colleges also. Some of the faculty members are regularly contributing to educational programmes of the MANA TV. The attendance of the students is recorded regularly and is monitored by the Principal. It is significant to note that the results of the students at various university examinations are commendable and a good percentage of students got first class. Some of them bagged ranks as well. The highlights of academic interests include the conduct of mock assembly, use of Language Lab by the Department of English, special

coaching for the SC/ST students, interactive sessions on Research Methodology for the PG students etc. The exhibition conducted by the Department of English in December 2000 was well received by the students.

#### **Criterion – III** Research Consultancy and Extension

The College has a Research Committee to co-ordinate the Research activities in the College. Two members of the Faculty are Research Guides – Dr. S. Sankar of the Dept. of English and Dr. V. Narasimha Rao of the Department of MBA. The management has a positive attitude in encouraging the teachers to pursue Research. The management has given travel grant to a teacher to present a paper in an international seminar in Italy. The MCA and MBA Students are required to do project work as part of their academic work. UGC has sanctioned 3 minor Research Projects, one each to the departments of Telugu, Sanskrit and Economics. The Departments of English and Telugu have been sanctioned funding for conducting seminars by the UGC. The Acharya Nagarjuna University has recognized the college as an approved Research Centre. The faculty has to their credit 36 published papers-6 with international journals and 30 in National journals. 14 teachers are carrying out Part-time Research. Two teachers have been awarded PhD degrees doing the last 3 years. The teaching faculty includes 16 Ph.D. holders, 24 M.Phil. holders. 10 teachers are pursuing PhD while 15 are working for M.Phil. The teachers of the College have participated in 18 International Seminars, 190 National Level Seminars, 20 State Level Seminars and a good number of workshops.

The College is involved in academic consultancy service as well as extension activities. As part of extension service the college has adopted 2 villages; Guruvindagunta and Zami Dintakurru for collection of data for Micro level planning by the Government. The College is also involved in other extension activities like training for Disaster Management, Health and Hygiene awareness, Adult education and Literacy, AIDS awareness and Women Development. The NSS and NCC units are involved in these extension activities.

#### **Criterion - IV Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

The College has a total built up area of 24531m<sup>2</sup>. The UG and PG libraries are partially automated. The barcode system is used for the issue of books. There is a collection of 64552 books of which 5056 are textbooks. The back volumes of journals and magazines are well bound and are available for reference. One computer is given to each of the departments. The Computer centre and the library function from 8 a.m to 8 p.m. on all working days and from 8 a.m. to 1 a.m. on holidays. Browsing facility is provided for students

and staff free of cost. The institution has enough rooms to house all the administrative programs.

New buildings are constructed depending on the need and regular maintenance of the buildings is done by the college building committee. Casual labourers are employed for the up keeping of the campus. Gymnasium is put to optimum use. There are 9 courts for various games and a 400 metre track with 8 lanes. The College has a well equipped sports department and an Indoor Stadium. There is an outdoor auditorium as well as an Indoor auditorium. Students participate in the National and State level sports meets. Cash awards and sports kits are given to encourage the students' interested in sports.

The College premises is used for common entrance tests and Acharya Nagarjuna University spot valuation. Eco and Nature clubs of the College function well with A.P. National Green Corps directives. The Office and Library works are computerized and AMC is given for computer maintenance. The College has two generators to ensure continuous power supply. Networking of library is done through INFLIBNET.

There is a Health centre to attend to the students' health requirements. Centre for instrumentation is available with machines and spares. Girls and Boys have separate Hostels. The Boys' hostel accommodates 72 students while there are 60 inmates in the women's hostel. There is a non-resident student centre in the College for the benefit of the day scholars. Mini library and indoor games facility are available in the Hostel. The College has audio visual facility and a 16 mm projector, compact disks, video compact disks etc are provided for the regular use in the departments. Online journals are available as E-library and e-service are the latest attracted concepts in vogue. There is a Bank counter on the campus. The College also has a Helipad to receive the VIPs.

#### **Criterion - V** Student Support and Progression

95% of the students appear for the examinations and the progression to higher education is 25%. The college has prominent alumni and most of them are well placed in society as senior government officials, public men of repute, professionals, business tycoons, industrialists and educationalists including Bhatnagar award winners. The college publishes updated prospectus every year with all details regarding scholarships, rules and regulations, academic schedules etc. Financial aid is given to the students under various heads of scholarships. There is a well functioning employment cell in the college.

Guest lectures are arranged periodically. Student profiles are maintained as part of ward counselling. The women's development centre and

entrepreneurial centre function well in the college. Students and staff are felicitated on their curricular and co-curricular achievements. The Language lab helps to enhance the communication skills of the students. Many add-on programs are conducted in the college to help the students to empower themselves to seek employment when they leave the college. There is perfect collaboration with the Rotract club for the development of leadership qualities.

In order to enhance their general awareness and encourage reading habits, students are made to write one quotation daily. The college maintains a system of awarding financial assistance to the economically poor students. There are 3 units of NCC of which one is a women's unit. Three cadets have participated in the Republic day parade at New Delhi and one of them got medal from the NCC group commander. There is one NSS unit in the college. The NCC and NSS units have adopted a near by village. Employment and placement cells function well in the college. 337 students are successful in competitive examinations like SLET, NET, UGC etc. Updated prospectus is available with all details regarding scholarships etc. Financial aid is given to the students under various heads of scholarship. Guest lectures are arranged periodically. Student profiles are maintained as a part of ward counselling. Women's development centre and entrepreneurial centre function well. Felicitation of staff and students are organized on their achievements in curricular and co-curricular areas. Efforts are taken to develop communication skills of the students with the aid of the language lab set up in the college.

#### Criterion - VI Organization and Management

Periodical inspection is undertaken by the AICTE and the University. There is an inbuilt mechanism for checking efficiency of administration and academic management. The Academic calendar is prepared well in advance.

Government supported programs are conducted. There is an internal audit mechanism for the verification of accounts. The college has a well maintained tarred road and garden. Tree plantation is undertaken by the Eco club to enhance the greenery of the campus. Water coolers and aquaguards are available to supply protected drinking water. The management is very considerate in providing these facilities to the students. There is active involvement of the Alumni and management in the development of the college. On the occasion of the Golden Jubilee celebrations of the college during 2000, the Alumni association actively took part in the development of the infrastructure and raised an amount to the tune of Rs.60 lakh for the construction of the new PG block. Intercom facility is provided to all the departments for easy access. Health services, training in yoga and meditation are being given. Facilities for vehicle parking, coin telephone and a bank counter are available inside the college campus. The management provides

emergency loans to the staff and also awards scholarships and proficiency prizes to meritorious students. Members of Staff and students contributed liberally to the "save little hearts" project and also to the Chief Minister's relief fund.

#### **Criterion – VII** Healthy Practices:

The Peer Team is pleased to enlist the following healthy practices of the A.N.R College, many of which are quite unique to it, especially considering the fact that the institution is placed in a fairly remote rustic location and many of its wards are first generation learners hailing from socio-economically challenged families:

- The Management Committee comprises of men of both, academic and social strengths and this has been the significant aspect of the institution's notable progress during its progressive growth and development through the years.
- Immaculately maintained college campus with appropriate and student-friendly sign-boards to display (i) Information regarding the range of courses offered (ii) Information regarding official contact personnel for enquiries (iii) Daily display of Teachers on Leave, as well as neat display of inscriptions such as "Enter to Learn" at entry gate and "Leave to Serve" at the exit gate of the college building, are highly appreciable.
- It is evident that the institution, since its inception has continuously displayed notable sensitivity to the changing educational, social and market demands by starting from time to time, newer UG combinations, self-financing PG courses, add-on courses and certificate courses. This has kept up the spirits and aspirations of generations of students.
- Throughout the growth of the college, there has been marked augmentation of need-based infrastructure, which is tastefully and usefully planned and executed.
- UG and PG laboratories are designed and maintained very well and the museums of life science departments are built with care and scientific thought. The small but neatly-maintained botanical / medicinal garden has added value to the academic environment.
- The institution has formed an Alumni Association as early as in 1974 and this Association has been vibrant and highly supportive to the developmental programmes of the college. During the Silver jubilee and Golden Jubilee celebrations of the College, it has played a pivotal role and during the latter it has been further strengthened into the acronym ANRCOSA (ANR College Old Students Association)
- One of the revelations to the Peer Team was the membership of the alumni association drawn from a wide spectrum of illustrious men and women who have reached coveted positions in their own fields of pursuance. Several generations of alumni made it convenient to meet with the Peer Team and place on record their genuine gratitude to the institution's efforts in shaping

their careers. Even when the institution was in its infancy and not as well equipped as it is today, it was affirmed to be a harbinger of personality development of its students. The Alumni Association has also been very supportive and assuring to future innovative academic pursuits of the institution.

- The library resources made available to the students, including e-learning material, online downloading facilities, CD books, reprographic facilities, internet connectivity, DELNET and LAN facilities are noteworthy.
- The computer facilities with 236 portals, uninterrupted power supply with a 11 KV substation are praiseworthy acquisitions.
- The general learner-centreed ambience of the college with dedicated teachers and proactive management has been instrumental in producing generations of men and women of substance, knowledge and integrated personality.
- The commitment of teachers and Principals (past and present), who have served the institution for long spans of time, in curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities of the students is amply reflected in all spheres.
- Many non-teaching staff members have found a place in the institution on compassionate grounds. This has rendered them to grow well with the institution and cherish fond memories. They have also been provided with a number of welfare measures.
- Both in the PG and UG libraries, there is a practice of awarding best library utilization prize to students, as an incentive to motivate them to consult the library more frequently.

#### **Part III: Overview:**

Based on the validation of the SSR and additional documentary and spot evidences gathered during the visit, the Peer Team is pleased to place on record the following Overall observations:-

#### **Commendations:**

- The significant societal perception and confidence that the institution has gained over the years of its existence stands testimony to the high quality of education imparted to its wards.
- The massive infrastructure developed, the learner-centreed support system and the notable outreach activities all speak highly of the academic ambience made available to the socio-economically challenged student population of the rural area.
- The service motto of the management with specific future strategic developmental plans for the institution are laudable.
- The thoughtful exposure of students to Indian heritage, culture, fine and performing arts as well as value education has led to the production of notable citizens with laudable civic responsibilities.

- The entire exercise of planning the contents of the SSR, displaying documentary evidences in support of the activities in each department and logistical show-casing of the institution's strength to the peer team, was of a high order.
- Amicable interpersonal relationships amongst all the components of the college have been responsible for sustained loyalty of the personnel to the institution.

#### **Suggestions:**

- Creation of an "in house" research culture by developing a research centre and encouraging all the PG staff in general and aspiring UG staff in particular to upgrade their academic strengths to suit research pursuits is desirable.
- The institution may work towards seeking autonomy and grow up to a deemed university - a dream that is cherished by the Management. This would give the necessary freedom to it to perceive and implement focused community-based and need-based academic programmes.
- There is need to focus attention on improving the academic development of its PG teaching faculty and draw the expertise of senior/qualified UG faculty in PG programme enhancement.
- Unless otherwise there is a definite advantage to the institution in locating the hostel mess away from the hostels, it would be more meaningful and convenient to locate the facility within the hostels.
